## COMPENSATION IN CASE OF MERCHANT SEAFARERS SUFFERING IN WAR

A British government scheme which provides compensation in the case of merchant seafarers who are killed or injured during the operations of the war has already proved a great boon in alleviating considerable distress which otherwise would have prevailed.

In connection with this matter, the Imperial Merchant Service Guild has lately succeeded in establishing an important principle in respect to our seafarers who have been interned in Germany and Turkey. It has, unfortunately, happened that three of their members have died during internment. The guild have investigated the whole of the circumstances and with the help and influence of the chairman of their parliamentary committee, Basil E. Peto, M.P., have urged that cases of this kind should justly be regarded as due to the operations of the war and that compensation to their dependents might reasonably be forthcoming under the government scheme.

The Board of Trade have now agreed that where death is due to the circumstances of internment compensation should be allowed. One of these cases which the guild has taken in hand on behalf of a widow of an interned officer left with three children has now been settled and the Liverpool and London War Risks Association, which administers the government scheme in this particular case, is paying over to this lady the sum of £200 by way of compensation, a result which has given the guild much satisfaction and for which the lady in question has expressed her gratitude.

## NEXT A. O. H. SESSION IS TO BE IN SAN FRANCISCO

The last session of the biennial national convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians was held at the Copley Place, Boston, on last Saturday morning. The principal business was the election of officers and the choosing of the place for the next meeting, to be held in 1918.

San Francisco was the city selected by the delegates, winning the honor by a vote of 192 to 40.

The balloting resulted in the election of the following to office: President, James McLaughlin of Philadelphia (re-elected); national vice president, Patrick P. Cannon, Clinton, Mass. (re-elected); Canadian vice president, Peter J. Doyle of Montreal, (elected without opposition); national secretary, Thomas J. Mathews of Providence, R. I.; national treasurer, Michael W. Delaney of Chicago (re-elected).

The following five were chosen national directors: Edward R. Hayes of New Brunswick, N. J.; James Clancy of Ishpeming, Mich.; John E. Healy of Wilmington, Del.; and Myles McPartland of Brooklyn, N. Y. Philip J. Sullivan of Thompsonville, Conn. was the only new director elected, the other four having been in office since the last election. Mr. Sullivan is the retiring national secretary.

## Shows Germans Hard Pressed

Troops Taken From Verdun to Face Allies' Advance on the Somme—Last Night's War Cables

At Posters, the Australians are still fighting furiously with the Germans for possession of the village and the head of the road leading from it to Bapaume, and the greater part of the village is now reported to be in their hands. There has been a diminution in the vicious fighting which began Saturday night along the British front from Thiepval to Guillemont. A condition of comparative quiet prevails south of the Somme along the French line, where the only fighting reported—and that of a minor engagement—resulted in the French capturing a German battery south of Estrees. Eastward, in the Verdun region, the French have occupied a German redoubt west of Thiaumont, taking with it five machine guns and two score of prisoners.

Berlin still asserts that the only result of the British attack Sunday along the Thiepval-Guillemont line was the penetration of a few houses in the village of Posters, and that the Australians obtained these only after having suffered sanguinary losses.

That German troops have been removed from the Verdun front for the Somme operation is apparent from the German statement that the Brandenburg Grenadiers, of "Douaumont fame," defeated the British in the light Sunday at Longueval.

On Eastern Front.

Although unofficial reports have credited to the Russians big gains against the Germans in the Riga sector of Russia, neither the Petrograd nor Berlin communication has as yet recorded any important changes in territory there. Petrograd claims the dislodgment of the Germans from the village of Galitshanc, on the Lipa river in Volhynia, while Berlin says that near the Galdian border, in Southern Volhynia, strong attacks by the Russians against the German line were repulsed.

Emperor William is reported to have left the French front to observe the operations in the east.

The Russians have made further progress against the Turks in the Erzerang region of Asiatic Armenia, while to the south, along the Persian front, the Turks report that they have gained fresh successes over the Russians.

The Italians in the Astico and Avis regions of the Austro-Italian theatres report continued advance against the Austrians.

Premier Asquith has asked the British parliament for an additional credit vote of 450,000,000 pounds—the largest requested since the beginning of the war.
