deceased \$60,000 For Public Services

MADE GREAT SACRIFICES

Born To Wealth, He Devoted His Life To Training For Help-ful Service

Montreal, July 8.—Numerous requests to educational and charitable institutions were made in the will of the late Lieut. Guy M. Drummond, who was one of the first Canadian officers to meet death at the battle of St. Julien or Langemarck.

Amongst the bequests made to public institutions are the following: McGill University, \$20,000; Canadian Church Anglican Missionary Society, \$10,000; Church of St. John the Evangelist, \$10,000; St. Margaret's Home for incurables, Montreal, \$10,000; Charitable Organization Society of Montreal, \$10,000.

Among the personal bequests is a sum of \$20,000 to Capt. Gregor Barclay now commanding the First Company of the McGill C. O. T. C., an overseas service. Capt. Barclay was one of Lieut. Drummond's closest personal friends, and shared his high ideas of national and imperial duty.

In addition to this Lieut. Drummond made a number of bequests to relatives and friends, leaving the whole residue of his property to his wife, Mary Drummond.

The will of the late Lieut. Guy Drummond gives no intimation of the extent of his estate, but sufficient to indicate the greatness of the sacrifice he made for his country when he devoted the thousands he inherited to the service of his country in England. He was born to great wealth, but devoted his life to training for public duty. He was imbued with the idea that with wealth went great responsibility, and trained himself for public duty both in peace and war.

They are beauty against some blue flowers whose name I know not, and while shells are dropping infernally from those beauty places women work in the fields and their children play beside them among the poppies. Each day I take some of these, but they go on indifferent."

Reports of a vast amount of work accomplished and large sums of money raised were submitted at the quarterly meeting of the New Brunswick branch of the Red Cross Society this morning in the office of the president Mayor Frink.

The treasurer, Lady Wiley, reported the following: The Junior branch, under the leadership of Miss Eileen Clements, has been very active. Col. E. T. Sturdee and H. A. Powell. There was a general discussion of the work throughout the province, and a resolution was adopted expressing appreciation of the provincial organization regarding the excellent work of the sixty branches and emphasizing the need for the continuance of such efforts. A copy of the resolution will be sent to each branch.

In her quarterly report the secretary told of the activities of the branches and of the great amount of supplies sent forward, amounting to 148 boxes. As a result of the socks day on April 20 the society sent forward 4200 pairs. The St. John and Rothsay branch furnished 1210 respirators for the 26th Battalion. E. Raymond. The articles contributed during the quarter total \$20,945 besides 108 yards of cotton and cheese-cloth, safety pins, absorbent cotton, etc.

Cholera epidemic spreads in Hungary. London, Tuesday, July 8.—A telegram to the Morning Post from Budapest reads: "I learn on good authority that in the prisoners' camp of Debrecen, on the northeastern extreme of the Hungarian Plains, between the seventh and thirteenth of June, 1,414 cholera cases occurred, with 312 deaths. There are now 17,000 prisoners in the camp, all Russians, and cholera seems to have spread among them to an alarming degree."
