NEAR - RIOT CAUSED ON SHIP BY THEFTS

Captain at Halifax Finds How Cut in Deck, Sailors Removing Liquor

HALIFAX, March 3.—There was a near-riot on board the three-masted schooner "Till," formerly rigged as a barquentine, last night when Captain Champion, the master of the vessel, which is lying in the stream, discovered that members of the crew had cut a hole in the deck and removed several cases of liquor from the cargo below. It was revealed here today.

The men were caught in the act, one below passing the goods up through the hole to another sailor. The deck, which is four inches thick, was first bored with an auger and then a block cut out large enough for a man to go through with ease.

It happened in the men's quarters, out of sight of the customs watchman and the officers of the ship who were on deck. It is understood that instead of prosecuting those implicated the crew signed on.

The customs watchman on board summoned assistance from the shore and the customs patrol boat "Violeta G." put off to the "Till." All the stolen goods were recovered intact.

CANADA - CUBA LINE PLAN ANNOUNCED

Summer Service From Montreal to Cuba via St. John's Newfoundland

MONTREAL, March 4.—It is announced by the Robert Redford Co. that, beginning with the opening of navigation on the St. Lawrence the Canada-Cuba Line, operating under the management of James Playfair, will maintain a service from Montreal to Cuba, via St. John's, Newfoundland. The Canada-Cuba Line came into existence last autumn with regular sailings of the Empress of Saint John, Empress of Saint John, Empress of Port McNicoll, and the Empress of Fredericton, between Saint John, N. B., and Cuba. This has proved of much benefit to shippers of Canadian products, it was stated, and the arrangements for next summer should be an advantage to the exporters of flour and of assistance to the Newfoundland cured fish trade.

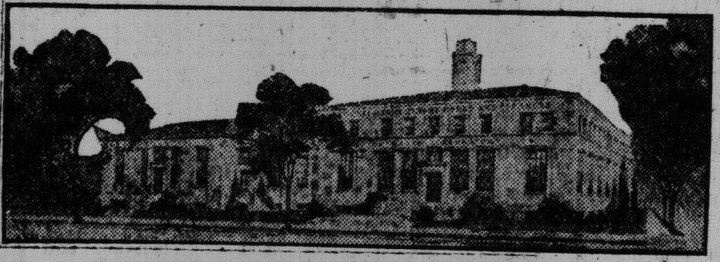

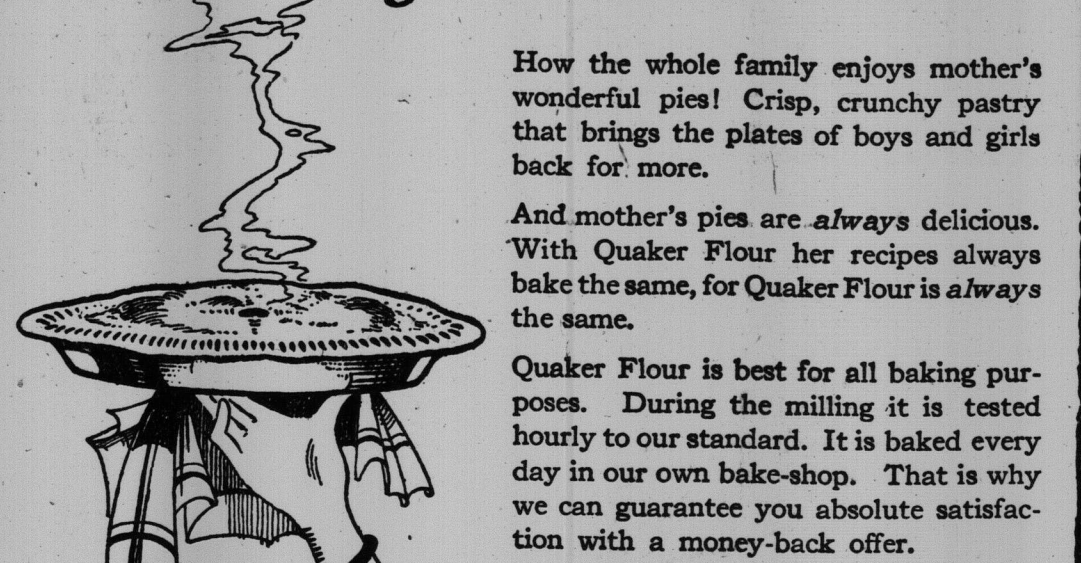
