A WEARY WORLD LOOKS FORWARD TO BRIGHTER DAY

Sir George Foster in Brilliant Address Explains Missions and Achievements of the League.

(Ottawa Journal.)

"The spirit which animated the Assembly of the League of Nations was a spirit outside of narrow racial, national or religious spheres, an intense hatred of war and an equally intense desire for peace. The human element was all that mattered, and the dress a member wore or the color of his skin made no difference. You took him for what he was worth as a human being, as a man of soul, spirit and mind, and you honored him for what he contributed of those elements. Differences faded out, and humanity met on a common platform. That was a fine indication in itself. After all, our dislikes of other peoples comes in the main from not knowing them or their point of view."

So spoke Sir George Foster addressing a joint meeting of the two Canadian Clubs in the Chateau Laurier last evening on the League of Nations.

Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Duchess of Devonshire attended, accompanied by Miss Joan Cobbold, Lady Margaret Scott, Miss McCullagh and Captain Balfour. Lady Foster sat at His Excellency's legt. The ball room was filled to capacity, the overflow extending to the back of the foyer. Among the most interested were Hon. Seizaburo Shimizu, consul-general, both obviously pleased with the subject, and Sir George's clear statement of it. Mrs. J. A. Wilson, president of the Women's Canadian Club, introduced the speaker, and C. A. Magrath, president of the men's club, put the vote of thanks.
