

WORK OF RED CROSS IN NEW YORK CITY

School Children Will Be Fed
and Health Information
Centre Established.

(New York Evening Post.)
Since health work on an unusually large
scale is to be carried on by the New
York County Chapter of the American
Red Cross this year, and nearly a mil-
lion persons in Manhattan will be reach-
ed by it, it was said today by John S.
Ellsworth, chairman of the board of di-
rectors. Although the work will be
largely preventive and educational, much
of it will be actually curative.
Fifteen hundred undernourished
school children will be given expert care
at the Red Cross child health stations
of the city, and in addition to being

brought up to normal weight will have
all other physical ailments, such as dis-
cussed tonsils and adenoids, ear and eye
defects, remedied. In co-operation with
the City Health Department experimen-
tal work is to be undertaken at Pub-
lic School 43, which Dr. S. Josephine
Baker of the Health Department has se-
lected as a typical old-fashioned, over-
crowded school to demonstrate what can
be done for New York children through
an efficient health service.

At Dr. Baker's request the Red Cross
will operate several nutrition classes,
conduct a dental clinic and give instruc-
tion in dental hygiene at the school. A
hundred and fifty dietitians and public
health workers from Teachers college
will use the school as a practice labora-
tory.

To Open Health Bureau.
A health information bureau is to be
opened at Greenwich House, 27 Barrow
Street, where, through the speakers' bur-
eau, lecturers on health will be provid-
ed for mothers' clubs, shops, settlements
and other organizations. During the
past eight months 34,650 persons have
attended lectures planned by the bureau.
Temporary and permanent invalids of
the city will be able to get at cost, home-
cooked food at the diet kitchen run in
connection with the Red Cross teaching
centre, 24 Fifth Avenue, and it is hoped
eventually to have these supplies taken
to the homes of the sick.

Needs of transient soldiers and sailors
will continue to be cared for and it is
expected that last year's record of 70,
000 will be passed. The disabled in hos-
pitals, those who have been discharged
as cured but still need help of some
kind, nurses who have been incapacitat-
ed through service, and their families
will be the organization's particular
concern.

CAPACITY OF ELEPHANT
FOR LIQUOR IS QUESTION
Chicago, Jan. 7.—The question of how
much liquor can legally be prescribed for
an elephant, camel or a dog is in the
hands of the federal grand jury today.
The grand jurors are investigating the
case of Dr. Bert Franklin, owner of a
veterinary hospital, arrested for issuing
too many liquor prescriptions. Frank-
lin's defense according to District At-
torney Clyne, is that the prescriptions
were issued for animals treated in his
hospital, but the government alleges
that owners of the animals drank the
medicine.



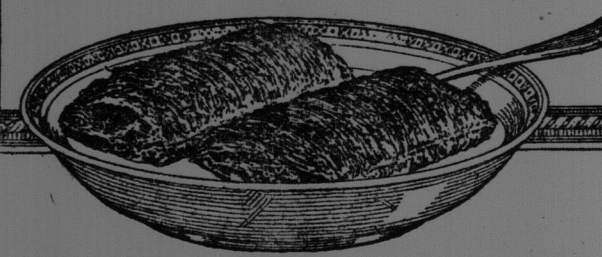

61 LYNCHINGS IN UNITED STATES

All Say Eight Are Colored
Persons, 1920 Records
Show.

Tuskegee, Alabama, Jan. 7.—Lynch-
ings in the United States were less nu-
merous in 1920 than in 1919, according
to records compiled at Tuskegee Insti-
tute, and made public today. Sixty-one
persons, including eight white men, were
lynched this year as compared with 83
last year and 64 in 1918, the statement
said.

In 66 instances in 1920 officers of the
law prevented lynchings, the reports
showed, 10 of these instances being in
the Northern and 46 in the Southern
States. Armed force was used to repel
would-be lynchings in 14 cases, and in
four of these mobs were fired upon,
seven of the attackers having been killed
and a number wounded. In 42 cases
prisoners were removed or the guards
were augmented, or other precautions
taken.

Of the 61 lynchings, 52 were in the
south and nine in the north. One was
a negro woman. Eighteen of those
lynched were charged with attacking
women.

The offenses charged against the
white men were: murder; insulting
women; one charge except being a
foreigner; one; killing officer of the
law, one.

By states, lynching occurred as fol-
lows: Texas, 10; Georgia, 9; Missis-
sippi, Alabama and Florida, 7 each;
Minnesota, Michigan, Carolina, Okla-
homa, California, 3 each; Arkansas,
Kansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri,
Ohio, South Carolina, Virginia, and
West Virginia, one each.

EIGHT NEAR DEATH FROM DRINKING WOOD ALCOHOL

(Boston Globe.)
Through testimony today in the Muni-
cipal Criminal Court it developed that
eight men were near death for a few
days in City Hospital from drinking
wood alcohol.

Late last Saturday afternoon the pa-
trol wagon from the division took in
eight men who are accustomed to stay
about Blackstone square. When they
arrived at the station house it was ob-
served that one man was very ill. They
were rushed to the hospital in charge of
special officer William J. Trainor.

Dr. Menary, as soon as he saw them,
ordered the use of stomach pumps. Even
after the wood alcohol was removed
from the stomachs of the men they
were very sick, and for a time two seem-
ed likely to die.

This morning five of the men appear-
ed before Judge Creed in Municipal
Court. They all pleaded guilty to being
drunk, and their cases were placed on

file. Three others were reported still
too ill to come to court.

One of the men told special officer
Trainor that he made some moonshine
for his own use, enough to "hide him
over" the holidays, but that he used
a paint pail as the "still" and he thought
the paint mixed into the "moonshine,"
making him ill.

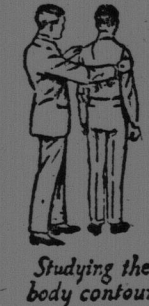
