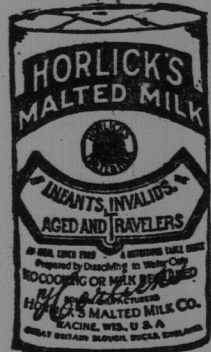

#### RECENT DEATHS

The death of William H. Beach took place at his home in Annapolis, N. S., yesterday morning from general debility. He was the oldest man in the county, being ninety-five years of age. He leaves two sons and five daughters.

The death is announced at Malden (Mass.), of Mrs. Caroline A. Dow, wife of Gideon Y. Dow. Mrs. Dow was formerly a resident of Canterbury (N. B.), where interment occurs. She leaves, besides her husband, a son and two daughters.

John A. McDonald, son of Mrs. John McDonald of Minto, was found in a dying condition in the cellar in his sister's residence, Fredericton, Thursday night, and passed away shortly afterwards. He had gone down to pump some water and was found unconscious shortly afterwards. It is thought his death is due to acute indigestion.

The death of Mrs. Guyon Mesereau took place in Bathurst Monday, Jan. 6, after an illness from peritonitis. She leaves, besides her husband, her mother, Mrs. Burton Somers of Newcastle, two children and two step-sisters.

George Irving, a former resident of Rexton, N. B., died at his home in Iron Mountain, Wis., Christmas day, after an illness from pneumonia. He leaves his wife, his father and two brothers.

The death of Mrs. James Conway occurred at her home in Rexton Jan. 7 at the age of seventy-two years. She leaves her husband, three step-sons, one step-daughter and two nieces.

#### DAUGHTERS OF NEBRASKA NOT INTERESTED IN BRYAN.

New York, Jan. 10.—The New York daughters of Nebraska, at a reception in the home of the president, Mrs. Dexter D. Ashley, expressed themselves as not being interested in any future political move taken by William Jennings Bryan.

#### Manitoba Elections.

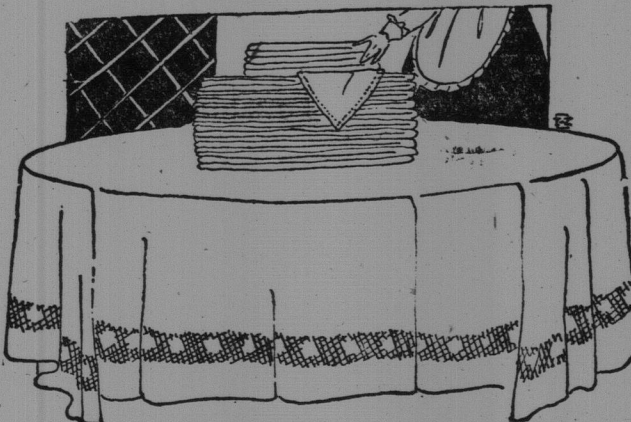

#### AN EXCEPTIONAL RE SOME WOMEN'S SHOES

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—"Ornamental" footwear such as ladies' shoes with colored tops, satin and the like, fancy slippers and all buckles for use on slippers," are exempted from the provisions of the Board of Commerce order dated November 26, fixing a maximum gross profit to the retailer of 33 1/3 per cent of the sale price.

#### JAMAICA GINGER KILLS.

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 10.—Theodore Pinstein, druggist, and Irvin Bodenheimer, a clerk in Pinstein's store, have been arrested in connection with the death of Mrs. Bertha Randle after drinking Jamaica ginger.

Pinstein is charged with murder and Bodenheimer with manslaughter.

#### WOMEN IN THE PULPIT.

London, Eng., Jan. 10.—"The shortage of clergy is a question which must be faced seriously," said the Bishop of Chester. "I should like also to extend the sphere of lay help. I am more anxious than I can say to enlist the services of highly qualified women. They form the larger part of our congregations, and the church will fail disastrously and, I will almost say, deservedly, unless it tries its best in a respectful spirit to enlist the services of qualified and able women."

#### LIBERAL LEADER.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will leave Ottawa tomorrow afternoon for Halifax where he is to address the first of a series of three meetings on Monday evening. Mr. King will speak at Charlottetown (P. E. I.), on Wednesday, and St. John, two days later. He will be accompanied from Ottawa by Andrew Haydon, general secretary of the National Liberal organization committee, and the party will be met at Montreal by Mr. Ernest Lapointe, Liberal member for Quebec East, who will also be a speaker at each of the three meetings.

#### BABY BORN IN SUBWAY.

New York, Jan. 10.—Dr. Sophia Andrews began the new year as a Bellevue ambulance surgeon. Her first call was to the Fourteenth street station of the Lexington street room there she found Mrs. Gilda Alvarez, twenty-four years old. The physician was just in time to assist in the arrival of an eight-pound baby girl.

Mother and daughter were removed to Bellevue. The little one will be christened Sophia Andrews Alvarez.

She wants to chat with everybody, and when the other night, "Order, order!" because she was talking to a member on the floor of the House, Lady Astor at once skipped across the bar and airily waved her hand at the chair as if to say, "All right, old man; never mind. I dare say I'll do it again before long."

#### CHANGE IN CONSULATE

Armando Lopez, Cuban vice-consul at New York, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon and will take charge of the local consulate, while Senor Andre Bohard y Ruiz, acting consul, is enjoying a vacation in his native Havana.

Senor Lopez said yesterday that he did not expect to go back to New York as he would like to be sent to fill one of the Hungarian consulates recently reopened.
