DELIGHTFUL CONCERT**

Boston Grand Opera Stars Heard Again Last Evening in Attractive Programme

Mme. Evelyn Scotney, Mme. Cara Sapia, M. Howard White and M. Alfredo Ramella from the Boston Opera Company were again heard to great advantage in the Opera House last evening. The audience, as on the previous evening, was small but very appreciative and each singer was given a hearty reception. Mme. Scotney was given a great ovation when she appeared on the stage. After her rendering of a piece from Mignon Je Suis during which she held the audience spell bound, she was heartily applauded as her last note died away. The applause continued until she gracefully acknowledged the reception given her and, to the delight of the audience, acceded to their demand that she should be heard again. She sang several familiar pieces in English and her favorite song Coming Through the Rye was presented in her wonderfully clear notes and afforded great delight to the audience. Other well known songs rendered as encores afforded equal pleasure.

Mme. Sapia was also given a great reception and her rendering of Flower crossed as her last note died away. Mr. White and M. Ramella were in fine voice and never heard to better advantage. John Craig Kelley is a wonderful accompanist and won the admiration of the audience in the marvellous skill he displayed.

The talented artists will spend Sunday in the city and will leave on Monday for engagements in other parts of the province when the people of Moncton, Amherst, Chatham and Fredericton will be given the opportunity of hearing them. After that the company will disband until the opera season reopens in Boston in the fall.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

The papal legate, Mgr. Stagni, on his arrival in Sumner, P. E. I., yesterday, was tendered a hearty reception. Clergy of the Catholic church from all parts of the island were present, and there was a very lengthy procession of members of the Knights of Columbus and C. M. B. to accompany him to St. Paul's church. An address was presented to the legate by the congregation.

Miss Pearl Johnson, of Port Elgin, was found dead in her room last night, with a bottle of carbolic acid nearby. She is thought to have died from drinking some of the poison. What the cause was is not known. She was about twenty years of age, and daughter of James Johnson, harness maker, of Port Elgin, to whom she left a letter the contents of which are unknown.

Chas. MacDonald, of Baddeck, N. S., was drowned yesterday by Grand Narrows, N. S., off the steamer Blue Hill.

William G. Sharpe, of Elyrie, Ohio, was appointed yesterday by President Wilson as U. S. ambassador to France.

John Barry, aged twenty-one years, son of Richard Barry, postmaster at Cape Tormentine, was drowned on Thursday while working on the schooner Hattie Reed bound from Boston to New York.

Theodore Roosevelt before leaving Paris yesterday for London gave out a statement in which he denied that the British explorer, Savage Landin, had crossed any unexplored lands in Brazil.

Fears for the safety of three balloons are expressed in Portland. One of them started yesterday on a national balloon race, but soon after their departure were caught in a thunder and lightning storm. One was driven to earth, but its two occupants escaped injury. The other three have not been heard from.

A brief protocol for the establishment of a basis of peace in Mexico was signed at Niagara Falls, yesterday by the mediators. A provisional government to be organized later, will be recognized by the United States, and a constitutional president will be inaugurated. No mention is made of Huerta. The constitutionalists were not parties to the protocol yesterday.

Reception at East St. John.
A reception was tendered last evening to Rev. W. W. and Mrs. Malcolm at the Presbyterian Hall in East St. John, to which district Mr. Malcolm has been appointed as ordained missionary. Rev. Gordon Dickie presided and the programme consisted of addresses by Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, Rev. James Ross, Rev. Mr. Stackhouse and Rev. Mr. Malcolm and music by Miss Edith Magers, Miss Ward, Mrs. Gilchrist and Mr. Russell.

Attempted Suicide.
Patrick O'Neill, who attempted to cut his throat in the county jail last Sunday, has been brought back from the hospital and yesterday was brought into court and charged with attempting suicide. Some evidence was taken and the prisoner was remanded.
