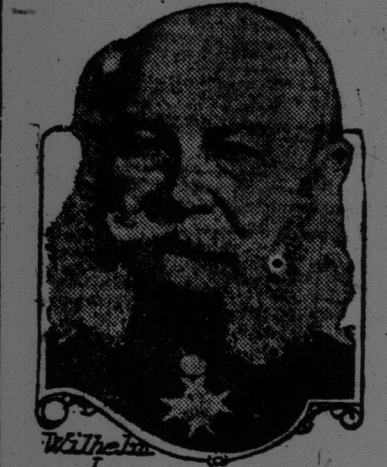

SAYS INDIA'S ARMY CAN EQUAL RUSSIA'S

Maharaja of Idar on His Way To Join Allies at Front

FIVE PRINCES NOW SERVING

People of India Eager to Fight—Maharaja's Secretary a Suicide Because Not Allowed to Go With Him

A Cairo dispatch to The London Daily Chronicle says:—I have just obtained an interview with his Highness the Maharaja of Idar, Dhiraj Shri Doss Singhji, who is passing through Egypt on his way to join the general staff at the front. He is the fifth of the Indian princes to leave India on active service.

The Maharaja is the adopted son of the renowned Sir Pratap Singh. He was able to give an excellent idea of the great wave of imperial enthusiasm, loyalty and devotion which, aroused by the war, has swept over the people of all races and creeds throughout the length and breadth of the Indian Empire.

"The size of the Indian army which will take part in the great war," he told me, "depends, of course, on the wishes of the king-emperor, but I may say that every Indian, old and young, would most gladly and enthusiastically respond to the king-emperor's call."

"Our difficulty is that only a comparatively small number of men may go to the battlefield at present. As it is, many officers and Indians of high birth are going in the ranks. My two sons, or grooms, are captains; my personal servant is very well-to-do and they came with me because it was impossible for them to go in any other capacity. Even the grooms who came to Bombay with our horses and then had to return home went away dejectedly and in tears. It was with great difficulty that they were persuaded to return."

The Maharaja told me a pathetic story of his own military secretary. After bidding farewell to the maharaja the secretary together with his family and friends said good-by to them, and shot himself, overcome with grief that he could not proceed to the front with his master.

The Maharaja of Jodpur, who is only seventeen years of age, was at first thought to be too young to serve with the army in the field. The young ruler's mother, however, supported him in his desire to fight for the king-emperor, and at last he wrote to the viceroy, "Why, he asked, am I not allowed to go? I have three brothers, so if I am killed in battle it does not matter." Permission was no longer withheld.

"You know," added the Maharaja, "we Indians believe that those who die in battle go straight to Paradise. To die in battle is not to die. Our names live, and we are proud. Now is a very good time to die."

Asked whether, now that Turkey had entered the great world of war, there was any feeling on the part of Mohammedans on the side of Turkey, the Maharaja replied:

"Emphatically, no. What is Turkey now? She is only a football, driven on and coerced by the Germans. She has no claim to represent Mohammedanism. No, indeed! We are all, without exception, on the side of the empire to which we are so proud to belong."

"Take the case of Rajputana. That state has an army of 80,000 men, but no fewer than between 500,000 and 600,000 men have offered themselves and are willing and eager to serve. Nepal's army consists of 80,000 men. They are all at the emperor's disposal.

"If, indeed, the Emperor requires an

army as large as that of Russia, India is able to supply it, and will be proud to do so.

"So determined are the tremendous numbers of the people of India to fight for the king emperor that, if only the battlefield were nearer and not separated by seas from India they would go even without orders to fight."

HE WEARS IT LONGER NOW.

A year or so ago the consumers of Canada were going very largely on the maxim—"Damn the expense." A Canadian shirt maker put the case very aptly just after the war when he said, referring to shirts that he sends from ocean to ocean:

"Oh the average man wears a shirt longer now."

In the heyday of our almost unparalleled prosperity Canadians flung out money for goods that they only half needed and only half used when they got them. We had prodigal sons in every household. The best was none too good; the latest was none too modern; the most expensive was none too costly for most of us. And as long as that kind of economy could hold up we had what we called prosperity, which was the most hazardous thing we ever had, because we built a great deal of it on extravagance and treated most of it as a miracle.

We are wiser now. When we buy a \$1.50 shirt and find that the laundryman bores a hole under the neckband in five washings we grouch over the waste; and well we may. The rest of that shirt is as good as new. To chuck it into the ragbin is sheer and wilful waste. The shakeup that the war brought to a head in our economic affairs has made us all place a higher premium on actual value. It has caused our buyers to be more careful without being parsimonious; our salesmen to be less careless about foreign competition; our manufacturers to be more particular about giving us the last cent of value in the dollar without regard to profit. It has made us a people less solicitous about mere big business and more careful about good trade. It has made us set more value on wages and less upon dividends. It has made us put the long pedal upon actual value for the money we spend for the goods that our manufacturers make, and the soft pedal on the prodigal notion—"Damn the expense."

And this is doing Canada more good than all the big business ever did the country in our days of so-called prosperity for it has resulted in the "Made in Canada" movement.
