Sir:—I read with interest, the young American's experience in St. John given in yesterday's Times. I had a similar one myself. Last spring two friends and I landed in St. John, none of us overlanded with cash. Our first week was \$7.50 tax. This we did not mind so much, but our second week was the glaring insult to emigrants posted all over the city. "One New Brunswick is worth a dozen immigrants." What a welcome, what hospitality. My two friends picked up and went to Edmonton, where both are doing well. I have often wondered if the author of those boasting, bragging placards, ever takes a stroll, say from Marsh Bridge to Reddy Point via Brassey and King's Square and notice the lay, drunken loungers, who would rather stand on a street corner and freeze to death than even when good wages are offered. What do you think an immigrant's first impression is on seeing so many strong, able-bodied men looking? My first thought was, how can I get work if all these people, native of the place, cannot get it? But on looking around I soon found work went plenty of it, and that was all I came to Canada for, and as long as I can get in the east I have no intention of going west. But if St. John wants immigrants, who must let them see that they are welcome and not look at them as things to be shunned. One letter written by a satisfied immigrant to his native country does more good than hundreds of dollars spent in advertising.

ADDRESSES AND PURSES TO ARCHBISHOP

St. John Priests and People
Bid His Grace
Farewell
A GREAT GATHERING

Cathedral Scene of Presentations
on Eve of Departure for Van-
couver—Feeling Reply of His
Grace Closed With His Blessing

The Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Waterloo street was filled last night with a very large congregation on the occasion of the presentation of testimonials from the clergy and laity of the diocese of St. John, to His Grace Archbishop Casey on the eve of his departure for Vancouver. The presentation from the clergy was made by Rev. Dr. A. W. Mahoney, and that on behalf of the laity by William J. Mahoney.

The altar was brilliant with candles and beautiful with flowers. At 7:30 o'clock His Grace, accompanied by the priests of the diocese, entered the sanctuary. He was attended by Rev. Dr. Guertin, C. S. C., of St. Joseph's College as high priest; Rev. H. D. Cormier as deacon, and Rev. Joseph McDermott as sub-deacon. The other priests in the sanctuary included: Rev. W. G. Chapman, vicar-general; Rev. Dr. Mahoney, Rev. Dr. S. O'Keefe, Rev. E. Conway, Rev. W. Holland, Rev. W. Duke, Rev. R. Lockhart, Rev. J. Lockhart, Rev. A. Poirer, of St. Martin's; Rev. A. J. O'Neill, of Silver Falls; Rev. J. J. Walsh, Rev. J. Boegmans, C.S.B., and Rev. R. J. Coughlan, of St. Johnville.

After the procession to the sanctuary, His Grace read the address and the addresses were read by Rev. Dr. Mahoney and Mr. Mahoney presented. After this His Grace, accompanied by the priests of the diocese, entered the sanctuary. He was attended by Rev. Dr. Guertin, C. S. C., of St. Joseph's College as high priest; Rev. H. D. Cormier as deacon, and Rev. Joseph McDermott as sub-deacon. The other priests in the sanctuary included: Rev. W. G. Chapman, vicar-general; Rev. Dr. Mahoney, Rev. Dr. S. O'Keefe, Rev. E. Conway, Rev. In his address to the clergy, the archbishop said that he was leaving the diocese of St. John, among whom you have labored long as priest and bishop, desire to express to you publicly their good wishes for your future and their gratitude for the kindness they have on so many occasions received at your hand.

Hence, the expedients of the times and the growing needs of Holy Church demand that the association of years between you, the bishop, and us, the clergy of the diocese of St. John, be broken off, and while we deplore the necessity, we also rejoice in the fact that just and due recognition has been shown you in your promotion to the Archiepiscopal See of Vancouver.

The interest taken by you in the advancement of religion in this diocese and your tactfulness in dealing with all public affairs for the good of the community at large, have shown you to be not only a churchman but also a broad-minded citizen.

Through your pastoral letters, sermons and general guidance of the priests and people, harmony and good-will have been brought about among classes and creeds, to all of whom you have endeavored yourself by your goodness and kindly interest.

We, therefore, beg leave to express our appreciation of these things and with united voice and prayer in bidding you farewell, we ask that the same Providence that has guided you in the western states of the country may long preserve you as a

brave champion of Holy Church, and in further token of our esteem, desire that you accept this accompanying gift.

Remembered by Laity.

When His Grace had received this token of gratitude, William J. Mahoney read the following address from the Catholic laity of the city, and presented to the archbishop a purse of gold.

Your Grace: This evening the Catholic laity of St. John and neighboring parishes are assembled to say farewell and wish you God's blessing in your new field of labor.
Your retiring and in the interest of religion and the uplift of your kindly word and heart, which we have all experienced in our hour of need, make the task of bidding you good-bye one of mingled regret and difficulty. Our remembrance of you as priest goes back over a period of twenty-six years, when as a young man you came to labor amongst us in the vineyard of the Lord, and later when the manifold care of the Cathedral parish house, for public worship and ceremony, and your never flagging interest in the good of souls impressed itself upon all, until at length you were deemed worthy of the elevation to the Episcopate of Holy Church.

During these years, meeting you frequently in different ways of our lives, we have noted with pleasure your high sense of duty, your zeal for the beauty of God's house, for public worship and ceremony, and your earnestness in the cause of education and temperance, which we had already learned, the Holy Father has placed upon them the mark of his estimable approval and raised you to the exalted dignity of Archbishop of Vancouver; and while we heartily regret your removal from St. John we must recognize the fact that you have been a true follower of your teaching how in humble submission to authority and respect for the opinions of others, from among us, which has merited this high commendation of Holy Church.

We shall not, however, delay longer in bidding you adieu, for the qualities you possess—traits of character that have endeared you to those who have known you and felt your influence as a kind father, a just and wise counsellor and true friend. And now recognizing in you these qualities, which we had already learned, the Holy Father has placed upon them the mark of his estimable approval and raised you to the exalted dignity of Archbishop of Vancouver; and while we heartily regret your removal from St. John we must recognize the fact that you have been a true follower of your teaching how in humble submission to authority and respect for the opinions of others, from among us, which has merited this high commendation of Holy Church.

We assure them, Your Grace, that the laity of this diocese will follow your future labors for the upbuilding of the church in the West with the same interest and devotion, accompanied by their fervent prayers that God may spare you many years to continue the good work which you have begun in St. John, and as a mark of our kindest regard and gratitude, we ask that you accept the accompanying presentation.

The address was signed by W. J. Mahoney, chairman, Joseph Harrington, secretary, and Thomas Gorman, treasurer.

Archbishop's Reply
In replying to the addresses, His Grace said the occasion was one of the most solemn hours of his life. He had been twenty-six years amongst the people of the diocese, the first half as one of the humblest of priests and in the other half raised in the heights, the heights of solitude because, after all, no one was so much alone as the bishop. His counsels he must keep, he must rule and govern, and whatever there might be of criticism he must stand alone. For twelve years that had

been the speaker's exalted but laborious lot.

None knew better than he what great things there were to be done and how little his poor hands had been able to accomplish. But his priests, who were his consolation and strength, and his people who were his support and comfort, had been pleased now to give him official approval of all his past efforts of the twenty-six years.

The first half, spent as a priest, had been indeed happy years, both in St. John and Fredericton, and little did he think that so soon would be heard a voice from the Vatican hill, the voice of an old man of ninety, the great Leo XIII., sounding across the ocean to Fredericton and calling him to the episcopate of Holy Church. His Grace then eloquently traced back through the succession of 203 popes to

Peter in citing the authority from God to the head of the church on earth and he then made brief reference to some of the works carried on in this diocese during the years in which he had been Bishop of St. John.

The cathedral had been made anew, other buildings in the city and been renovated and others built by the co-operation of priests and people. Many churches had been built throughout the diocese and others repaired and improved. For all this he offered thanks to God and to priests and people. The spiritual advance had been ten-fold greater.

His Grace also referred to his duties as a citizen. He took this solemn occasion to publicly express his appreciation of the generous consideration received from all, including his separated brethren, the memory of the gracious assistance and great kindness he had received from the whole people of the city and diocese would never grow dim. He had been honored as a guest with governors general, lieutenant governors and others in high places in the civil life and a stranger would almost have thought by the reverend people, that he was too good in his own people but all were his spiritual children.

Again speaking his thanks to priests and people, he said it was too deep in his heart for utterance. Neither distance nor the elevation to the archiepiscopal dignity would ever weaken the affection he had always had for the people of St. John, and of the diocese of the southern part of New Brunswick. They would always be in his prayers, and often he would raise his hand towards the shores of the Atlantic and by God's grace impart a blessing to them. His Grace asked for the prayers of all for himself and closed impressively with the words, "God's blessing be on the city of St. John, God's blessing be on the diocese of St. John, God's blessing be on you all."

DECLARE HYDE GUTLY

New York, Nov. 29.—Charles H. Hyde, former city chamberlain, a native of Tyro (N. S.), was found guilty tonight of bribery in connection with the performance of his duties as a city official. The jury which has been hearing his case in the supreme court rendered its verdict shortly before midnight after nearly three and a half hours deliberation.

DAMAGES FOR NON- PAYMENT OF WAGES

Editor Times:—
Sir:—The cases where wages are detained without any reason whatever, are very numerous, as it is possible to see from the following information from Edmonton:—
Edmonton, Sept. 28.—In giving judgment for wages to six Grand Trunk Pacific laborers, Magistrate Byers declared that the road's treatment of some of its employees, that had come under his notice, was disgraceful. "I myself," said the magistrate, "have known men to have to wait for three weeks for their wages, before they could leave town, when they had another situation ready for them at some other place." During this time they had to pay board, besides the loss of their time. Hence, in such a position apply to the courts, they in the best case receive only their unpaid wages, and nothing at all for the time which they lose, as according to the existing laws, all their damages are limited by that amount, which is unpaid to them.

But such a view cannot be recognized as correct. According to the clear and definite words of the writer about damage in the encyclopaedia Britannica:—
"The object of legal compensation should be to place the injured person as nearly as possible in the situation in which he would have been but for the injury."

If a workman, after losing three weeks (as in Edmonton), will receive only his unpaid wages, and nothing for the time which he loses, as according to the existing laws, all their damages are limited by that amount, which is unpaid to them.
