HALF MILLION DOLLARS TO OPERATE GREAT FARM IN THE WEST

Plan to Reduce to Scientific Basis the Business of Getting Wealth From Soil

Winnipeg, April 26—A unique departure in Western Canadian farming methods is being inaugurated by George Williamson, of Brandon. He is in the city on business connected with the Moose Creek Mixed Farming company an organization capitalised at \$500,000 with land at Delisle, Saskatchewan.

The plan of this company is simply to reduce general mixed farming methods to a permanent scientific basis with a general view to eliminating all waste and to get the maximum of return from the soil through the greatest possible number of years.

Mr. Williamson is confident that his scheme will yield huge dividends and that it will be a paying proposition from the start. A competent manager will be secured and he will be placed in control of the farm, which will embrace several thousand acres and which will be equipped with buildings necessary to yield great returns.

The promoters of the scheme who are supposed to include Hon. Hugh Armstrong, provincial treasurer of Manitoba, anticipate that this company will prove something in the nature of an experiment at farm for the surrounding municipalities and that it will be a boon to agriculture in this way.
