## CHURCH BELLS CALL THEM TO FIGHT THE FIRE

**A St. Martins Hotel Burned to Ground and for a Time Other Places Are Threatened**

A fire which threatened the existence of the whole village of St. Martins, resulted in the total destruction of the Hunter Hotel last night. The fire broke out about half-past eleven o'clock and burned until four o'clock this morning, when nothing was left of the building, except the chimneys and the foundations. The people in the house were aroused from their sleep by the alarm of fire and made their escape without waiting to add any garments to the nightclothes in which they were clad, and the exposure to the cold night air may have serious consequences on some of them. The origin of the fire is not definitely known, but it is believed to have started from the fuse of the furnace.

The flames were first noticed by some one passing the house, and the alarm was hastily given, first to those in the house and then to the rest of the community, by the clanging of the church bells. Wm. H. Hunter, the proprietor of the house, and his wife and daughter and four boarders were asleep at the time, and when aroused by the cry fire, all rushed from the building in their nightclothes. It was found by this time that the danger was not so serious as it appeared, and the neighbors, who speedily arrived on the scene, they succeeded in getting all the furniture and other effects out of the house, although the contents were somewhat damaged in the process.

For a time, as the flames mounted higher and higher, it was feared that the whole central part of the village would be wiped out, and the energies of the men were directed towards preventing the spread of the flames. Owing to the lack of fire-fighting facilities, it was impossible to save the hotel. A large building in the rear was torn down, with the aid of teams of horses, to prevent the flames spreading. It was only because of the fact that there was no wind, and that the roofs of all the buildings were covered with snow that the damage was not much greater.

The hotel was a two and a half storey with a two storey ell of frame construction. The building, which was formerly known as the Ingraham House, was valued at more than \$7,000. The insurance carried was \$1,500 with the British Crown, and \$1,500 with the Hudson Bay Company on the house, and \$800 with the British Crown on the furniture.

## SATURNIA BROUGHT 50 CREWSDALES

**Donaldson Liner at Sand Point After a Rough Passage—Had More Than 100 Passengers**

After a night day trip from Glasgow, the Donaldson Liner Saturnia, Captain David Taylor, arrived in port early this morning and docked at No. 5 berth at Sand Point. The steamer left Glasgow on Saturday Nov. 18 and on her way across encountered some exceptionally stormy weather. On the first three days out the weather was fine, but on Wednesday afternoon a strong gale sprang up and lasted for the best part of three days during which the steamer made comparatively slow time.

There were thirty-four cabin passengers and seventy-nine steerage, and practically all suffered from sea sickness. The forward rails were damaged to some extent by the heavy sea buffeting, but outside of this the steamer was little damaged. The storm abated somewhat on Friday and after that fine weather was enjoyed. The officers of the ship, however, all of whom have been here before, say that it was one of their worst trips.

The Saturnia docked at No. 5 berth about seven o'clock and the passengers were landed almost immediately. Most of the cabin passengers got away early this morning and the steerage people will go forward later in the day. The steerage passengers are mostly all Scotch and are nearly all going west. They are a fine, healthy looking lot of people.

Among the cargo brought out there was a shipment of fifty Clyde-built mares, imported by William McFarrie of Russell, Ont. Twenty of them will be sold at public auction in Woodville, N. B., on Dec. 8. They are good looking animals. The mares were examined this morning by Dr. Mackay, V. S., and were found to be in good condition. The Saturnia also brought out a small supply of Scotch coal, of which there has been a shortage here. She brought out a large general cargo besides.

After landing some of the cargo in No. 5 berth, the steamer will be moved across the slip to No. 4 berth to finish unloading. The following are the cabin passengers:

The Saturnia will leave here on her return voyage on Dec. 9. Another Donaldson steamer is due to arrive in port on Saturday next. The Athens, which is at present unloading in C. B. Wharf at the Long Wharf, will be moved back to Sand Point either this afternoon or tomorrow morning to take on cargo.
