

DRY DOCK FOR PRINCE RUPERT

G. T. P. APPLICATION
FOR SUBSIDY APPROVED

**Company Will Spend \$1,200,000—
Dominion Marine Department
to Establish Depot**

(Special to the Times.)
Ottawa, July 6.—The government has approved the application of the Grand Trunk Pacific for a subsidy on a dry dock of the second class at Prince Rupert.

The company will build a dock costing \$1,200,000, able to handle vessels of 20,000 tons. The subsidy is 3 1-2 per cent. of the total cost for 25 years.

The marine department will establish a depot at Prince Rupert, including a lighthouse and buoy service, at an expenditure of \$160,000.

AVIATORS SET NEW RECORDS AT RHEIMS

Aviation Meeting in France —One Man Injured

Rheims, France, July 7.—The world record for a 200 kilometer aeroplane flight was broken to-day by Hubert Latham, who flew the distance in two hours and 46 minutes.

Ollieslayers, of Belgium, endeavored to break Farman's record of four hours, 6 minutes and 26 seconds of continuous flight.

After he had been aloft three hours and 39 minutes Ollieslayer had travelled 160 miles, which is in itself a new world's record.
