CHAMBERLAIN'S CAMPAIGN. Has Risked His Political Life Before This. But Has No Fear for the Personal Result of His Present Crusade.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Continuing his campaign, Mr. Chamberlain tonight addressed a meeting of 4,000 persons in the Town Hall of Greenock, Scotland. He dealt particularly with the questions of retaliation and reciprocity.

The late colonial secretary said that he was a free trader and wanted to live harmoniously with his neighbors, but he desired free exchange with all nations. If they would not exchange he was not a free trader at all prices.

Mr. Chamberlain proceeded to refer to the enormous output of the United States steel corporation works and the demand in the United States for steel and contended that this steel would be sent to Great Britain, the only free market, and he said: "Three years you will have dumped 10,000,000 tons of American iron and thousands of British workmen will lose employment for the sake of a few American workmen."
