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RAILWAYS LIABLE FOR FULL BAGGAGE VALUES

Ontario Court Holds Limitation Clause on Baggage Checks Does Not Apply Unless Passenger Assents

Toronto, June 16.—In a judgment given at Ousewood Hall this morning, the appellate division ruled that no matter what conditions a railway company prints upon the back of baggage checks, the company cannot limit its liability unless it proves that the passenger assented to the conditions...

This is the decision in the judgment which dismisses the appeal of the Canadian Pacific Railway from the judgment of Judge Dennis in favor of Herbert P. and Harriet Isabel Spencer, of Toronto, for \$350.50, for the loss of a trunk last July...
