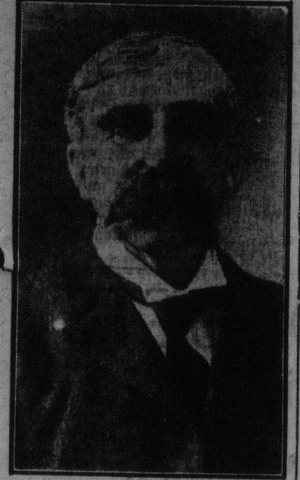


FOUR WELL KNOWN MEN QUITE ILL

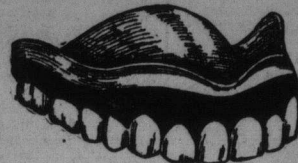
