CAMPABELLO.

Campobello, Nov. 18.—Campobello goes over the top in Victory loans. Rev. G. E. Tobin and John P. Calder, canvassers for the Victory Loan wound up the campaign in Welshpool and North Road on Saturday afternoon. The evening of their canvass was beyond all expectations. They sold 64 bonds amounting to \$31,000 (thirty-one thousand dollars). The whole island was expected to raise \$25,000 (twenty-five thousand). While it is not definitely known how much was raised at Wilson's Beach yet, the reports from there are most encouraging, and it is expected that when their subscriptions are added to those from Welshpool and North Road the total amount for the island will be \$50,000 (fifty thousand), which is double the amount asked for.
