NOTICE **EMPLOYERS OF LABOR**

WHEREAS on the 17th day of April, A. D. 1919 His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring within the scope of Part 1 of the WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918, from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz:

Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulp-"wood, firewood, railroad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, "booming or the transportation of logs, timber, pulpwood, firewood, "or railroad ties or sleepers."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file a statement of their estimated payroil from August 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, inclus-ive with the said Board, on or before the 1st day of August, 1919.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part two of the said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

Also please take note of the following regulation passed by the Board, and coming into force on the 1st of August, 1919.

FIRST AID KIT. In an industry where ten or more persons are employed, it shall be the duty of the employer to provide a suitable FIRST AID KIT AP-PROVED of by the Board and in charge of a suitable person.
