

# NEW COMPANY TO CONDUCT PORK FACTORY IN CITY

## Stock to Be Raised on Five Farms That Have Been Purchased—Company Has Option on Site for Factory—Those Behind the Project.

A new pork packing factory of large capacity and modern equipment is to be built in the city of St. John. The project is being undertaken by the New Brunswick Packing Company, Limited, which has been organized for the purpose of raising stock on five farms in the province and erecting a factory to pack the same.

The company has been incorporated by provincial charter under the name of the New Brunswick Packing Company, Limited. The directors chosen include J. M. Robinson, president, and J. W. Wood, vice-president. A. C. Corbett, managing director, and C. N. Keenly and W. W. Corfield, T. H. Foster, have been appointed secretary-treasurer and Barton, Mayhew, & Company, auditors.

St. John is named as the head office but temporarily in case the plant is located outside of the city limits. The authorized capital stock is \$200,000 of which only \$70,000 will be issued at present and \$45,000 has already been subscribed.

The object of the company is to carry on an extensive pork raising and packing business and for this purpose farms are already well matured.

In order to assure themselves of a sufficient supply of the raw material, the company has purchased five farms with a total area of 1,270 acres and these they will raise hogs on a large scale. The farms are 450 acres at River Glade, sixteen miles from Moncton; 200 acres at Salisbury, 140 acres and 100 acres on the Hampton road near Quispamsis and 300 acres at the St. John river near Public Landing. Each of the farms is well equipped with farm buildings and modern machinery and ground has been broken for the crops which will provide food for the stock.

In addition to the ordinary products the company will also manufacture side lines to care for the entire by-product of the factory and thus ensure the most economical operation. When the business is under way they will first supply the local market to the extent of the demand and will then devote their attention to building up the export trade, which should offer large possibilities.

# HERE'S THE PARCEL POST RATES IN EFFECT FEB. 10

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—The rates on the new parcel post system are out. The plan will go into effect on February 10. The zone system of charges has been adopted to prevent excessive charges for short distances and to save the department losses on parcels carried great distances.

In Ontario and the maritime provinces there is a twenty-mile zone and then everything else in Canada rates in. In the maritime provinces rates on a parcel sent up to twenty miles are: one pound, five cents; two pounds, six cents; three pounds, seven cents; four pounds, eight cents; five pounds, ten cents; six pounds, twelve cents; seven pounds, fourteen cents; eight pounds, sixteen cents; nine pounds, eighteen cents; ten pounds, twenty cents; eleven pounds, twenty-two cents.

The Seattle Post Intelligence, referring to his death, states that Mr. Wood, after serving in different capacities in the United States, established the Seattle Trade Register, which he controlled at the time of his death. After serving in the east for the government, investigating the coal situation, he returned to the States and travelled extensively giving addresses. Referring to Seattle he organized the Turner-Wood Company, doing an international trading business, and it was in connection with that company's business that he was in the "Orient" at the time of his death. His death came as a great shock to his friends, as it was supposed he was in his usual health. The deceased had, however, suffered for years with a stomach malady, and it is supposed this was the cause of death.
