## SHELL KNOCKS

SOLDIER 25 FEET

Gardiner Man Gets Letter From Brother Who Has Miraculous Escape in France

William Cosgrove, of Gardner, Me., has received the following from his brother, Ambrose, who was wounded in the bat- tle of Langemark:

"Dear Brother—You will no doubt be glad to hear of my being lucky enough to escape death, which has overtaken so many of our poor fellows. It is almost too much for me to describe to you, but nevertheless I will tell you what I can, and that will only be a small part of what will happen.

"We were given a position to hold on Hill No. 40 on the last Saturday in April about four o'clock in the morning. At five o'clock we were given the order to charge the enemy and take three lines of trenches in front of us. We all got ready and when the final order came we started. The Germans ran like a flock of sheep and I am sure we must have killed over 4,000, for the dead Germans covered a stretch of ground over a mile long and 500 feet wide.

"After we got into the trenches one half of us were ordered to go on to the second line for support of the first. Then the Germans started to send their deadly gases along, also a heavy shell fire. We all had to put our faces to the ground so that the gases would not get us, so we could not see anything. The night was pitch dark, and the roads were crowded with horses and vehicles of all descriptions and hundreds of troops, many of whom were wounded. The sky was streaked with fire from the shells which screamed and burst overhead.

The remainder of the battery piled out with me, waiting for the teams, or ready to put her out of action if the Germans surrounded us. After ten or fifteen minutes a man ran across the front of the battery, he was my corporal (Corporal Hicks), who had charge of the teams. He had been told that the gun was lost and it was certain death to go near her.

As we didn't have our major with us and we were attached to the 11th Battery, we were rather left to look after our- selves. I told the corporal that we had to get out ourselves and that we might as well get popped off getting out with the battery. We were all huddled around the gun for protection, as the shells were popping around us like fire-crackers at a Chinese New Year's celebration in Frisco. I told the corporal to bring in the teams and that two of us would stand at the wagon, and two at the gun ready to hitch her in. The six drivers were all gone to come in, and they came on the gallop, and it was only the work of a few moments to hook in the teams and away the cor- poral taking the wagon out one gate while I took the gun out the other. We were now left behind the rest of the column. As we tore along the road a staff officer called, "What battery is that?" I replied, "A gun, 8th Battery, sir!" "Are you all right?" "All correct, sir!" "Thank God! Take the first road to your right!" This put us on our bearings, and after a gallop we caught up with the battery. We were all in a state of joy and excitement, as they had given us up for lost. Not a man was wounded, and only one horse on the gun team got hit by a bullet on top of the neck which killed it. Both horses were too much praise cannot be given Cor- poral Hicks, who ran to the gun after being told it was useless to try to get the gun out.
