EGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 18—Afternoon.

After dinner Hon, Mr. Crawford introduced a bill to facilitate the construction of the St. Martins & Upham Railway.

Mr. Lindsay moved the House into committee, Mr. Landry in the chair, on his bill to establish the number of members of the House of Assembly. The bill provides to reduce the representation from forty-one members to thirty-four, apportioned as follows The City of St. John, 2; County of St. John, 2; Charlotte, 3; Northumberland, 2; King's 3; Westmoreland, 3; Queen's, 2; Sumbury, 2; Albert, 2; York, 3; Carleton, 2; Yictoria and Madawaska, 2; Restigouche, 2; Glouces er, 2; and Kent, 2.

Mr. Lindsay argued in support of the bill, chiefly on the ground fhat the representation should be by population. He showed that St. John city, with 28,988, had two members, and the County with 23,315 had four; Charlotte with 28,882 has four; Northumberland with 20,116 has four; King's with 24,593 has three; Westmoreland with 23,385 has four; Queen's with 13,847 has two; Suntry Queen's with 13,847 has two; York with 27,140 has four; Carleton with 19,100 has two; Victoria with 11,641 has two; Restricted with 18,810 has two; Kent with 19,100 has two. The infairness of this state of things should impress every member in favor of his bill. In Nova Scotia, where there is a population of over 300,000, there are only 38 members; 34 would, he thought, be quite sufficient for New Brunswick, with a pepulation of a little over 285,000. Mr. Napter chaimed that it was unconstitutional to reduce the representation, and cited from the British North America Act to support his views. If the number of members of the House is reduced its prestige will be lessened. He closed by recommending that progress be reported, with leave to sit again.

Mr. Hibbard said there was great need for the changes suggested, and to render the matter more fair to all he would consent that even Charlotte should rose a member. Carleton and Kent and even Gloucester should have more representation.
