PRIZES.

The sum of \$300 was generously given to the College by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on the occasion of his recent visit to this Province, with a view to the establishment of prizes. This money has been duly invested by the authorities of the College, and the interest will be annually expended in the bestowment of a Gold Medal and two prizes, to be styled the Prince of Wales' Medal and Prizes.

The Medal will be awarded to that student of the graduating class who may have sustained the highest standing in all the prescribed subjects of the curriculum, during the four years of study.

The remaining two Prizes will be awarded in the same way to the second and third best students of the graduating class.

In addition to the above there are three prizes established by John George Hodgins, Esq., L.L.B., Deputy Superintendent of Education, who, several years since donated the handsome sum of \$635 for their permanent endowment.

The first of these is styled the Ryerson prize, the second the Webster prize, and he third the Hodgins prize. The Ryerson prize will be annually awarded to that member of the Freshman class who may evince the best knowledge of Scripture History; the Webster and Hodgins prizes are open for competition to the Junior and Senior classes, and will be awarded to the respective authors of the first and second best English essays on such subject as may be assigned by the Senate.

DISCIPLINE.

Students connected with the College will be expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all regulations imposed by the President and Faculty.

A record is kept of each Student's deportment, and will be furnished to parents in special cases.
