LAKE SIMCOE MISSION.

The Rev. Thomas Hurlburt was appointed to this station. After serving the Society for many years, he has felt it is duty to transfer his labours to the Indian Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The Mission, during the year, has made some little advance. There has been an addition of 4 White members and 15 Indians. There are 135 Indian members, of the Church.

SAHGEENG MISSION.

The Indian Missionary, George Copway, laboured here the past year. It seems, from the increase of seventeen Indian members to the Church, that some success has attended his labours. The Mission has been no burden to the Society this year, the Indians having contributed out of their funds £100 to defray the support of the Gospel. The number of Indian members reported at the Conference was 134.

OWEN'S SOUND.

The Indian Missionary, William Herkimer, has faithfully laboured here during the year. The number of members reported at Conference was 4 White and 50 Indians. This Mission has been divided, and the present St. Vincent Mission detached from it. The Mission is in a thriving condition, and affords satisfaction to the Committee.

SCHOOGOG MISSION.

The Indians of Balsam Lake and Mud Lake have left their old localities, and have settled on the borders of Schoogog Lake. They have sent for a Schoolteacher, and have erected a house for him. The Mission is in a very encouraging state.
