


When he had made his statement in connection with the shipbuilding pro-stram to the House last session, Mr. Ballantyne said, there were 24 vessels in commission. Since that time 23 addi-tional vessels, with an approximate deadweight tonnage of the 47 vessels now in commission was 259,783 tons. There remained to be completed two ships of 10,600 tons each, nine of 8,300 tons, and five from 3,560 to 3,900 tons each. The entire program, when com-pleted, would comprise 63 ships of an approximate deadweight tonnage of 314,254 tons.
