Secretary Cunliffe of the G. W. V. A. Says It Will Equalize Pensions.

The proposed new pension scheme, as set before the parliamentary committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment by Secretary C. G. MoNeil of the Domin-ion command of the Great War Veterans on Monday has met with the approval of all soldiers concerned in this city. The proposals tabled by Mr. Mc-Neil are as follows: Increase in widows' pensions \$1 per one per cent of disability of pension base; pensions for guardians of soldiers' orphans; no deduction of pension because pensioner does not live in Canada, and the equalization of pensions irrespective of rank. Referring to the second clause, Secretary J. W. Cunliffe of the local branch said that if accepted it would be one of

the best schemes any soldier organiza-tion ever completed. "It calls for each pensioner receiving one dollar per month in proportion with the disability which he derived while on service overseas," he said.

### Inaugurating Fight Against International "Drug Ring"

New York, March 22.-Opening of a fight to curb the traffic of an international drug ring, which, he says, is 'headed by businessmen of Germany, Japan and Great Britain, was announced here today by Dr. Carleton Simon, special deputy police commissioner.

Declaring high-ranking officers of steamships plying between New York and the Mediterranean and South American ports have been transporting drugs to the United States, Dr. Simon said that many raids are planned and developments of a startling nature expected. The crews of six steamships are now under surveillance, he added. The deputy police commissioner said the leaders of the "ring" had been identified, but that action against them was impossible, as the laws of their countries do not prohibit trafficking in narcotics.
