Over Half Million Gallons Per Day

WATER AND LIGHT COMMISSION MET.

The regular monthly meeting of the Water and Light Commission was held yesterday afternoon all the members being present except Mayor Kutt. While the business was principally routine the report of the Manager for Feb. was very gratifying. In view of the fact that an impression has gone abroad in Kitchener that sufficient water could not be supplied the City the fact remains that during the month of February 15,766,250 gallons or a little better than 563,041 gallons per day was sold to them. The report for the month follows:

Report for Feb. 1919.

Water Dept. Amount of water pumped in Feb. 23,920,000 gallons. An increase over Jan. by 3,000,000, gallons, or an average daily pumping 854,285 gallons.

The lowest number of gallons pumped in one day 470,000 gals. The highest number of gallons pumped in one day 1,120,000 gals. Turbine pump was operated 403.3 hrs. or an average of 14.4 hrs per trip. Triples pump was operated 56.33 hrs.

Kilowatts consumed for pumping 44,340.

No. 1 Boiler was under steam 600 hrs. No. 3 Boiler was under steam 84 hrs.

Average steam pressure for month

56 lbs. Coal consumed during Feb. was 22,499 lbs. or an average of 800 lbs. per day.

January average was 857.5 lbs. per day.

There was no fire alarm in Feb. Kitchener got 15,766,250 gallons of water in February.

The air compressor which was purchased to increase our water supply was shipped two weeks ago and is expected to reach here any day.

The installation will require a week, when we expect our supply will be increased by at least 300,000 gallons per day.

With reference to maintenance account of water meters, which I mentioned in my last report, we had a call from a manufacturer who intends making meters in Canada and we are in hopes that the year in this will give us less trouble than the make that are now in use.

About four years ago we bought a sample meter made in England, which has been in service ever since, this was taken off a few days ago and I submit it for your inspection.

This department is running quite satisfactorily.

Referring to electric motor drive for the fan, we find in installing the 10 H.P. motor that it will take less power than our first test showed, and will effect more saving than we thought at first.

We also made a test of the booster and it proved quite satisfactory, this will require a 1 H.P. motor and an 8 inch valve to complete the installation.

The engine has been overhauled at a cost of about \$30.00, and will be available in case of emergency.

Else, Dept.

The voltage regulator which was ordered last summer is here and is at present being installed, and will be in operation next week.

I attended the annual meeting of the Ontario Municipal Association in Toronto yesterday at which various matters were discussed and are of importance to this Commission.

Street lights were burning a total of 355.75 hours or an average of 12.63 hours per light.

Hartley Dewart Makes Charge Against Ayeart

Charges Liquor Inspector Shared in \$44,000

EARNINGS MADE BY DETECTIVES.

Government to Mame Commission to Probe Charges Made by M.P.P.

TORONTO, March 20.—The Ontario Government will appoint a judicial committee to investigate grave charges made in the Legislature to-day by Hartley Dewart, K.C., against Chief License Inspector J.A. Ayeart. The charges are that Ayeart as inspector had shared to the extent of \$44,000 in the earnings of detectives employed with a private agency while in the pay of the Government.

Mr. Dewart's statement came in the closing stage of the budget debate and was followed by an emotional calling for a committee of the House to investigate the accounts for license and temperance act enforcement back over a period of five years.

Mr. Dewart's amendment was treated by the Government as a vote of want of confidence and was voted down by a vote of 54 to 15. It was significant that J.W. Widdifield, the U.F.O. member in the Legislature, was with the Government. With the Dewart amendment out of the way, J.C. Elliott, of West Middlesex, moved another amendment calling upon the treasurer to present the public accounts in a clearer manner and this was defeated by the former division.

Mr. Dewart, in opening, launched into an attack on the packing interests in Ontario, demanding that the Government take over the handling of the Union stockyards, now controlled by the Swifts.

Then he went on to criticize the licensing of the Burns Detective Agency of a license to operate in Ontario. To show just what this action was the part of the provincial treasurer involved, Mr. Dewart unearthed the history of the Burns Detective Agency in the United States. The complaint about the licensing of the Burns Agency had naturally led to the discussion of the real subject with Mr. Dewart—the Homer liquor case.

Attacks Mr. Ayeart.

He attacked the course taken by Chief Inspector Ayeart.

"Whose check was it and why was this marked check used in this way for this particular transaction?" he asked. "If this man was not voting for the Government why should he give a marked check? Why was Homer chosen as the place where this liquor should be delivered and left in a vacant building and why was this time chosen? This was on February 11, and a everybody knew there was an election campaign on there. Polling day was but a few days away, and here on the 11th this Government agent gets the 77 cases of liquor and leaves it there at Homer. Why choose this vicinity and choose this hotel is something we may discover if we have the inquiry we should have in reference to this question."

"Had Mr. Ayeart's connection, with this agency been so close that he did not want to have it disclosed," he asked, referring to Mr. Ayeart's action in not giving the name of the employee's detective agency in court. He wanted to know what assurance there was that employees of the Ontario Government were not shareholders in these favored agencies.

"When one hears it suggested that one official of the license department is one of its prominent shareholders it surely is time for an investigation," he said.

"We want to know just what the position of Mr. Ayeart is in these matters. His explanation is far from satisfactory. If Mr. Ayeart is put in the witness box he will have to admit that he has profited by the earnings of private detectives. He will have to admit that while in his employ, private detectives were in the service of and paid by a private agency and divided with him moneys they received for their service with the private detective agency which he deposited to a special account to his own credit."

Receiving Money.

He will have to admit that for some time he was receiving his share of the money these men received from a private agency when they were on the pay roll and paid by the Government. We could force from Mr. Ayeart the admission that he was sharing in the money that was so received. In view of the close connection between this agency and this official might we not wonder if there is not some good reason for him selecting this agency?"

Mr. Lucas then explained the Homer case. It was simply a case of the department having reason to believe that certain men were doing large illegal business. But they had no evidence. So they had simply called in a private detective agency and had, in effect, said, "get them." The agency had one of its operatives who lived near Homer and he had got in touch with a man named Smith acting for the liquor vendors. Smith knew Clyde and fell in the trap. He agreed to sell 80 cases of liquor to them for \$3,200. The whisky was to have been delivered on a Monday and the local police were instructed to be there to capture both whisky and the men bringing it. But Smith, the seller's agent, failed to get it there on time. He delivered it next day but the police owing to the mix-up were not there and the men got away, although the liquor was seized.

was never presented, drawn upon a bank where there was no funds, a check that was not accepted by any bank, that just had the word "Accepted" written across it. They delivered \$3,200 worth of liquor and took away just a bogus little piece of paper.

"The honorable member has made a charge in this House," continued Mr. Lucas. A Challenge.

"My honorable friend can accept that position—stand up when called upon to do so and on his responsibility as a member of this House demonstrate to the House and the people that he is not endeavoring to humbug, that he is not endeavoring to use the shelter of this House to make a slanderous statement involving members of the House or the license board or the provincial inspector. If he will do the fullest kind of an inquiry will be made. He has made a most serious charge against a man whose name rings true in the Province of Ontario."

"Let him stand up now and say: 'I withdraw, I apologize,' or let him show his sense of responsibility and make a charge and we will grant him a committee, an inquiry of the fullest kind, and let him substantiate his charge or be branded as a man who makes that sort of an insinuation and won't stand by it."

In closing the attorney-general repeated his invitation to Mr. Dewart. If Mr. Dewart would make a charge that there was anything in the Homer case or any feature of it, that involved any irregularity or the payment of any Government in the check referred to or any reflection upon the conduct of anybody connected with the Government, he would have an opportunity to substantiate it. If Mr. Dewart would charge that any member of the license board or any official of it was invited or interested, directly or indirectly, in any money paid employees' detective agency he would

be given a chance to substantiate that, too.

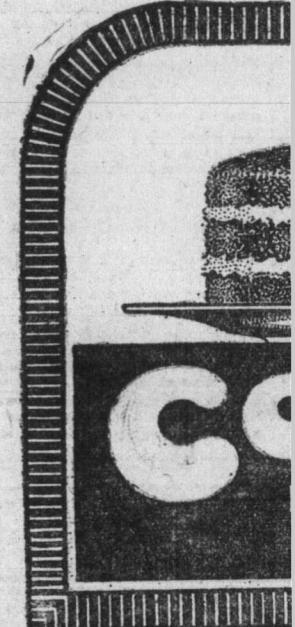
