## COUNTY COUNCIL

Continued From Page Three.

### SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The County Council resumed Sat-  
urday afternoon.

John Reyerat, chairman of the  
Finance committee, reported recom-  
mending that the following accounts be  
paid:

W. F. Lawrence, \$4.50.

Thomas R. Coogan, \$3.09.

Bell Telephone Co., \$12.50.

Wilson, Pike & Gundy, \$100.

W. G. McGeorge, \$39.25.

John Darling, \$2.85.

That \$25 be granted to the ferry  
across the river at St. Peter's church.

That \$40 be granted to Chatham  
and Dover ferry.

That \$30 be granted to assist in  
running a ferry at King's Ferry.

That \$25 be given to each Public  
Library in the County receiving the  
Government grant.

That no action be taken re request  
of the Ontario Rifle Association.

The report was adopted.

J. N. McCoy, chairman of the Roads  
and Bridges committee, reported as  
follows:

That no action be taken in regard  
to the painting of the County bridges.

That no action be taken in refer-  
ence to a grant of \$100 to the vil-  
lage of Thamesville.

That the grant of \$100 to the Ra-  
leigh and Tilbury townline be laid  
over till the June session in order to  
ascertain what proposition the two  
local municipalities will make.

That no action be taken at this  
session re bridge across the River  
Thames at or near Prairie Siding.

That no action be taken re the  
communication from the Good Roads  
Association asking that a delegate  
be sent to the convention at Ottawa.

That the grant of \$200 to the Elgin  
and Kent townline be laid over till  
the June session.

That the report of W. G. McGeorge  
on Long's Creek bridge be adopted  
and that the plans for the bridge be  
accepted.

That the special committee last  
year be authorized to confer with a  
committee from Lambton on the  
above specifications for the Victoria  
bridge.

That the main span and the north  
approach to Kent Bridge be painted  
as soon as convenient.

The report was adopted.

James Chinnick moved in amend-  
ment, seconded by Mr. Grant, that  
the report be referred back to the  
Roads and Bridges committee that  
they might insert a clause grant-  
ing that the bridge across the Thames  
River be built.

The amendment lost.

S. P. Sturges, chairman of the  
Legislative committee, reported as  
follows:

That the motion of Mr. Haggart  
and Mr. Vester to amend the Munici-  
pal Act be entertained, and as  
asked your committee to draft a  
petition to the Legislative Assembly  
of the province of Ontario. We at-  
tach a draft of the petition and  
would respectfully recommend that  
the Warden and Clerk sign said peti-  
tion and forward it to the Ontario
