large, ample, and beneficial Manner, as if the faid Proclamation. Commissions, Ordinances, and other Acts and Instruments, had not been made, and as may confift with their Allegiance to His Majesty, and Subjection to the Crown and Parliament of Great Britain; and that in all Matters of Controversy, relative to Property and Civil Rights, Refort shall be had to the Laws of Canada, as the Rule for the Decision of the same; and all Causes that shall hereafter be inflituted in any of the Courts of Justice; to be appointed within and for the faid Province, by His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall, with respect to such Property and Rights, be determined agreeably to the faid Laws and Customs of Canada, until they shall be varied or altered by any Ordinances that shall, from Time to Time, be passed in the said Province by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief, for the Time being. by and with the Advice and Consent of the Legislative Council of the same, to be appointed in Manner herein-after mentioned.

Not to extend to His Majesty in common Soccage.

Owners of Goods fame by Will, Gc.

if executed according to the Laws of Canada:

Criminal Law of England to be continued in the Pro-VIRCE.

Provided always, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend. Lands granted by or be construed to extend, to any Lands that have been granted by His Majesty, or shall hereafter be granted by His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, to be holden in free and common Soccage.

Provided also. That it shall and may be lawful to and for every may alienate the Person that is Owner of any Lands, Goods, or Credits, in the said Province, and that has a Right to alienate the faid Lands, Goods, or Credits, in his or her Life-time, by deed of Sale, Gift, or otherwise, to devise or bequeath the same at his or her Death, by his or her last Will and Testament; any Law, Usage, or Custom. heretofore or or now prevailing in the Province, to the Contrary hereof in any-wife notwithstanding; such Will being executed. either according to the Laws of Canada, or according to the Forms prescribed by the Laws of England.

And whereas the Certainty and Lenity of the Criminal Law of England, and the Benefits and Advantages refulting from the Use of it, have been fenfibly felt by the Inhabitants, from an Experience of more than Nine Years, during which it has been uniformly administered; be it therefore further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That the same shall continue to be administered, and shall be obferved as Law in the Province of Quebec, as well in the Description and Quality of the Offence as in the Method of Profecution
