Another significant reason for the acquisition of these courses is the fact that employers look upon them as assets which lower training costs, when preparing students for the Uniform Final Examination which they must pass in order to become Chartered Accountants.

According to the students concerned, the reasoning behind why these courses are not being offered is "Apparently there is no one to teach them."

Many of the students are left wondering if the Administra-

tion Board of UNB is really looking, while others are baffled with the question of "Can UNB not attract professors

who can teach these courses? The answer will probably come next year.

A student who wishes to re-

main anonymous overheard Ross Darling instruct Steven Grant to open some business courses which were closed, and

would later choose students registered for the course on the basis of their GPA, thus ruling out first come, first serve.
