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Many references are made to Anglo-Canadian-American cooperation in effort and ideal, in war and in peace. The significance of the war to the North American Continent and the Western hemisphere is clearly shown. Complete understanding between the United Kingdom and the United States is seen as essential to victory, and to the establishment of a just and lasting peace. The Prime Minister's accounts of his meetings with President Roosevelt and their momentous consequences are of historical importance.

Emphasis is laid throughout upon the maintenance of national and Commonwealth unity as the basis of a successful prosecution of the war. Careful planning of every phase of Canada's war effort and its organization in close and constant collaboration with that of the United Kingdom are set forth as the means taken to preserve national unity and to secure the largest measure of effective co-operation and common action.

Canada entered the war as a free and united nation at the side of Britain. Mr. Mackenzie King loses no opportunity of emphasizing the determination of the Canadian people to put forth their utmost effort till the hour of victory, and to remain to the end, freely and unitedly, at Britain's side.
