GAMEY IN MUSKOKA.

Mr. O. M. Arnold, Bracebridge president of the Conservative Association of Muskoka, has sent to the Toronto News the copy of a letter addressed to the Toronto Star, with a request to publish. The letter states:

"Mr. Gamey, M. P. P. for Manitoulin, came on the invitation of Mr. Mahaffey, with the consent of the officers and Executive of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Muskoka He did not come as a leader of the Conservative , party. Mr. Gamey makes no such pretensions. We did not and do not now doubt the right of Sir John Boyd and Mr. Justice Falconbridge to make the report they did on the Gamey charges against Mr. Stratton in particular, and the Government in general. We knew many of their judgments had been reversed in appeal, and we thought, and still think, Mr. Gamey that report and prove to the electors if he could, that the finding of the learned judges was erroneous in fact, and contrary to the evidence. Sure-By, nobody will now deny that in Muskoka, at least', Mr. Gamey susstained his appeal, and proved the meneral charge he made that the Governmen't had, by their breaches of faith with the electors, forfeited the wight to govern the province."
