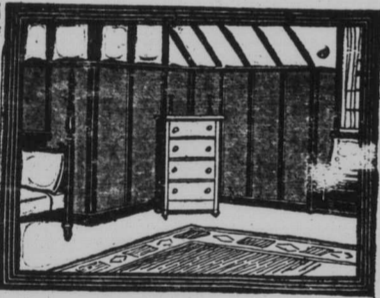

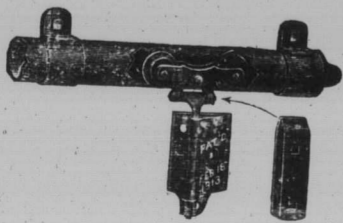

### LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards yesterday consisted of 205 cars, 4099 cattle, 231 calves, 914 hogs, and 1906.

There was a heavy run of cattle at the Union Stock Yards yesterday, 4099 being on sale. The great bulk of butchers cattle were very poor and sold at 25c lower than the close of last week. Shippers must not expect top prices for poor quality animals. The market was slow and draggy, especially on butcher cattle. Fat cows, bulls, stockers and feeders and milkers and springers were about steady with last week's prices.

Lambs, sheep and calves were steady. Lambs being, if anything, slightly higher.

Hogs took a big drop, being from 50c to 75c lower than the close of last week, and packers say they are going lower. One packer quoted as follows: E.o.b., \$11.40; fed and watered, \$11.90; weighed off cars, \$12.15.

### Fatally Injured

Roy Finley, aged 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Finley, living in Turnberry Township, just outside Lower Wingham, was, it is believed, fatally injured on Sunday morning. The young man had gone out to the barn to attend to a horse, and his mother found him under the animal's feet. One arm was badly crushed, and his head was also badly smashed. Dr. Hamby was called and he was taken to the hospital, where practically no hope is held out for his recovery.—Wingham Advance

### Items Of Interest.

Every few days during the fall months all hairs that contain eggs of botflies should be clipped from the horses' legs. By thus reducing the number of eggs the number of bots will be reduced.

With thirty cars of fruit on Winnipeg market Saturday, pears sold at \$1 to \$2.50 per box. No. 1 Duchess apples fetched \$5 per barrel.

Skimmed milk fed with crushed oats and oil cake will make calves thrive and produce veal at half the cost where whole milk was given.

The farmer who has a good colt has, perhaps, a natural tendency to stuff the little fellow with grain until he is almost as fat as a young steer. Nothing could be more fatal to the colt's future usefulness.

Europe is slaughtering not only men, but cattle, hogs, sheep, horses at a fearful pace. Grain production can be brought back to the normal in the first year of peace, but it will take several years to restore the world's live stock industry to pre-war conditions.

For some time an odd bottle has been missing from whiskey cases coming to Kincardine. On Tuesday night E. A. Henry and Chief Leithead "lay" for the man and got him. He is now in the lock-up awaiting trial. A large quantity of the wet goods has been abstracted from consignments shipped here.—Kincardine Review.

In no former war have the animals played so large a part as they have in this now raging. Besides the horses, mules and oxen, there are dogs serving in many ways, the cats ridding the trenches of rats and mice, the carrier pigeons and even the white mice of the submarines, which are taken aboard to give warning of any escape of gas.
