San Francisco, April 15.—Another horrible discovery was made yesterday morning in a small room in the steeple of
Emanuel Baptist Church where the
mutilated remains of young Minnie
Williams were found yesterday. The
church had been desecrated by a second
murder, the victim being another young
girl, Blanche Lamont, who had been
missing since the third instant.

She had been strangled to death, her
clothes had been torn from her person and
the body was almost nude when discovered. Her shoes and stockings were missing. The imprints of the assassin's finger
nalis are plainly visible on the murdered
girls' throat, but there was no indication
of further violence. Shortly after the
discovery was made Dr. George Gibson, San Francisco, April 15.—Another hor

discovery was made Dr. George Gibson, pastor of the church, was taken into custody by the police. No charge was made against him, but he will be held until the mysters is the custody.

Miss Lamont was last seen alive in the company of Theodore Durant, a young medical student and assistant superintendent of the Sunday school connected with the defiled place of worship. Durant, who is said to have been engaged to be married to Miss Lamont, is suspected of having taken the life of the Williams girl, who is known to have been a warm friend of Miss Lamont. They were members of the church which they frequently attended together and were also in the same Sunday school class. Since the disappearance of Blanche, Miss Williams often said that she knew that her comdisappearance of Dianche, ansa williams often said that she knew that her companion had met with foul play. This statement reached the ears of several members of the church and the girl was

members of the church and the girl was asked for an explanation, but she declined to reveal the nature of her information and the matter was dropped.

The police are now inclined to think that Durant, knowing that Miss Williams was in possession of sufficient evidence to prove his guilt in connection with the disappearance of Miss Lamont, concluded to decoy her into the church and silence her forever. One of the most damaging witnesses against the young medical student is Chas. Hill, who resides across the street from Emanuel Baptist Church. Shortly after eight o'clock Friday night he saw a man and woman standing near the street torque. the street corner. They chatted together for some time and finally started up the street toward thet, church. When the church was reached the man caught the girl by the arm and half draged her to the gate leading to the pastor's study. After a few minutes conversation the couple passed through the garden and finally entered the church through a side door. Hill is positive that the man opened the door with a key and was apparently thoroughly familiar with the premises. Suspecting that something was wrong he waited outside for a few minutes, but hearing no outery concluded that the couple were members of the church and went to his home. The description given of the man who accompanied the girl tallies exactly with that of Durant. A thorough search is being made for him.

Will Act With Russia in Re-Japan of Attempting to Gain Time by a Policy

London, April 15.—Japan's terms of peace are approved with practical unanimity so far by the London newspapers. Both the Conservative and the Liberal organs express the opinion that the conquerors are not asking too much. It is even reported that the demand for the cession of the Leaotang (Shingking) peninsula has evoked no vigorous English protest anywhere. But the tone of the Berlin official press indicates a disposition on the part of the German Government to act with Russia in resisting this demand. The point is made in Berlin, and in Vienna, too—and it is understood that representations, to such effect have been made to the English government—that Japan cannot be allowed to have a line of harbors from Formosa to Port Arthur unless the other maritime powers get important concessions for their own navies in the east. A Fromment Man Assassinated—Three Others Shot Dead,
Paris, Tex., April 15.—News of a bloody fight reached here from the eastern portion of the Choctaw Nation. Ever since the Jones-Locke war of two years ago murderous enmity has prevalled between men of different political belief. Only a couple of weeks ago the Choctaws, who can not speak English, learned of the troubles that existed between Governor Jones and Dick Locke. Last Monday Arnold Islitche was shot down by an tinknown man in his own yard. He had been an avowed friend of Governor Jones and was a man of prominence. His assassination aroused the whole community and the Cooper brothers, who had always been warm friends of Locke, were suspected of the crime. On Saturday Solomon Lonaker and three of their friends laid in wait two miles from Eagleton in Solomon Lonaker and three of their friends laid in wait two miles from Eagleton in the Choctaw Nation for the Coopers. As the latter came up the Lonakers opened fire from ambush with Winchesters. Their fire was returned. There were five men on each side and for several minutes a deadly fusilade prevailed on both sides. The results were not known until yesterday morning when Gov. Gardner, of the Choctaw Nation, chanced to pass the place. He found Simpson Lonaker and his brother, Cornelius Cooper and Tom Forbes dead in the road within a few feet of each other with their Winchesters in their hands. Near his dead brother lay William Cooper shot in a dozen places, William Cooper shot in a dozen places, but alive and conscious. He gave Gov. Gardner a detailed statement of the whole America,
