LOCAL OPTION IN CARDINAL

Many in Athens are personally acquainted with Rev. Geo. MacArthur of Cardinal and all who have heard him preach will be slow to believe that he could take a fanatical view of any subject. The following letter, clipped from the Union's official organ, will, therefore, possess particular interest to readers of the Reporter in this locality:—

We carried local option in Cardinal by a majority of seven, and while we sometimes hear of many of our laws being violated we know of no infringement of this law. The general opinion, so far as I can learn it, is that there is no liquor sold in our village. The municipal council seems to have no trouble with it and our constable does not worry over local option enforcement.

Those once addicted to strong drink are sobering up and paying their debts. The people are delighted with it. Very few now miss the bar. Every word said in favor of the bar turns out to be untrue. The requirement of a three-fifth vote is in my opinion a grievous mistake. The majority of the people of this country are anxious to get rid of what they feel to be a financial burden and a very great curse in any community. Why saddle them with a three-fifth vote? We have two good hotels here. Commercial travellers say accommodation is of a high order. In my opinion it is much better than when we had the bars. Two fine houses meet the trains. Under license we had only one. We suffer not one single inconvenience by the removal of the bars. The traffic is so securely buried that it can never have a re-ur-rection. I trust that temperance workers will not be discouraged by the unfair legislation that has just been passed. Let them rise to the occasion and roll up the required majority. By the Grace of God they can do it.

After a year's experience with local option I can cordially commend it to every municipality in the Province. I know of no law that is more loyally obeyed."
