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

TOWNSHIP COUNCILS

DOVER COUNCIL.

The adjourned Court of Revision on the Rankin Creek and Cantlay drains met July 9. The members were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. A number of changes were made in the Rankin Creek drain assessment, and only changes were made in the Cantlay drain assessment, and the Court of Revision on each drain closed.

The council met for general business. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. Some accounts were ordered paid, and the council adjourned to meet at the call of the Reeve.

The council held a special meeting on July 21. A. McDowell's report on the repair of the Boyle drain was read. A petition was read signed by Peter Cadotte and several other ratepayers on the Hind drain, asking that an improved outlet be provided for said drain, as the present outlet is not sufficient to discharge the water coming down the drain. Some of the ratepayers on the Rankin Creek drain petitioned the council to appoint Joseph Rankin commissioner on the repair of said drain.

The Rankin Creek drain improvement by-law and the Cantlay drain construction by-law were read and finally passed.

Moved by Lewis and Terry, that A. McDowell's report on the repair of the Boyle drain be adopted and a by-law be prepared, and that the Reeve be appointed to serve the Reeve of Chatham Township with a copy of the said report.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Terry, that the petition or request of Peter Cadotte and others asking for an improved outlet for the water of the Hind drain along the 9th concession be adopted, and that J. W. Shackleton, Esq., C. E., be instructed to examine said Hind drain and locality and to provide an improved and sufficient outlet for said Hind drain, make plans, estimates, assessment and report thereon to the council.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Terry, that Wm. Whitebread's account, \$10.50, be paid, as per order of engineer, re survey of Boyle drain.—Carried.

Moved by Terry and Lewis, that

the petition or request of Peter Cadotte and others asking for an improved outlet for the water of the Hind drain along the 9th concession be adopted, and that J. W. Shackleton, Esq., C. E., be instructed to examine said Hind drain and locality and to provide an improved and sufficient outlet for said Hind drain, make plans, estimates, assessment and report thereon to the council.—Carried.

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Moved by Lewis and Terry, that Wm. Whitebread's account, \$10.50, be paid, as per order of engineer, re survey of Boyle drain.—Carried.

J. W. Shackleton's account be paid, \$20, for plan, estimate, assessment and report on Front concession mechanical drain, and \$25 on McKenzie drain repair.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Terry, that Timothy McQueen be paid \$1.75 for re front concession mechanical drain.—Carried.

Moved by Terry and Lewis, that A. McDowell's account, \$163, be paid for surveys, plan, and report in duplicate on the repair of the Boyle drain.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Terry, that Joseph Rankin be appointed commissioner on the repair and improvement of the Rankin Creek drain and that Edward Cadotte be appointed commissioner on the construction of the Cantlay drain.—Carried.

Some of the accounts were passed. The council adjourned.
