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CANNED AND EVAPORATED GOODS TRADE.

during 1903, in addition to the extracts from his annual report published last week. FRUIT PULPS;-

Their is a good demand for the following fruit pulps which can e put up in Canada;- Srawberry, Raspbery, Goodsberry, Black Currant Peaches, Pears, Apricots The above fruits are largely used in jam factories in Great Britzin.

Canadian packers of fruit pulps should observe the following point.

1. Use a heavy grade of charcol tin blates for making the cans.

2. Do not us rosin for soldering the inside seems as the least portion imparts a bad flavor to the contents.

3. One gallon tins are preferable to cans holding five gallons chiefly because there is less loss in case of a puncture or other cause of damage.

For colored pulps an internally lacquered tin is very

much prefered. No, colloring matter or preservatives of any kind shoud be added.

Have cases holding cans made strongly and with tight covers, not slats.

Power of the Press.

Advertisements offering our free farm lands were placed in papers with a circulation of 5,800,000, reaching one-third of the United States people. The Editorial Associ-ation was invited over and escorted irom the Atlantic to the Pacific. The editors went back and wrote appreciative accounts in their papers, which the department promptly collected in the form of a book, and then circulated 500,000 copies of this testi-

"Agents are now on pretty good terms with the press there, and they refuse to insert matter derogatory to our work," said Mr. Sifton. In 1897 it was impossible to convince farm-ers in Southern Minnesota that wheat ers in Southern Minnesota that wheat fit for the mills could be grown in Canada. Last year 40,000 came from the Western States into the North-

west. In Great Britain the work had In Great Britain the work had been organized on business principles, the semi-diplomatic methods of the High Commissioner's office not being adapted to the conditions. A news-paper devoted to the resources of Canada had been prepared and mail-ed to 1.500,000 names of practically all the farmers and farm laborers in the United Kingdom. Forty to fifty thousand dollars a year was seent

the United Kingdom. Forty to fifty thousand dollars a year was spent on advertisements in papers reaching ten millions of readers. Half a mil-lin books on Canada had been put in the schools, and 25,000 wall maps.
