

## KING EDWARD SHOOK HANDS

With the Members of a United States Regiment,

And Congratulated Them on Their Appearance.

Trooping of Colors Postponed on Account of Weather.

London, June 30.—The trooping of the colors, the main feature of King Edward's birthday celebration, had to be postponed to-day owing to the inclement weather. Troops of Seventh regiment, G. S. M. C., however, proceeded to Buckingham Palace, where they were received by His Majesty.

Fourteen members of the Regiment marched through the Mall to the Palace, assembled in the Ambassador's room and thence were ushered into the throne room where the King welcomed them. The presentations were made by Colonel Sir Howard Vincent of the Westminster Volunteers. The King expressed his pleasure at seeing the Americans and congratulated them on their appearance. He said he was glad to hear they had found the British rifleman hospitable and he knew the Americans to be in the case of a visit from British marksmen. The King shook hands with each of the visitors on their departure. Most of the reviews, naval and military, in honor of the King's birthday, had to be postponed on account of rain. The usual salutes were fired at the garrison towns and at the ports the warships were dressed.

## SUMMER THEATRE.

The speaker, Mr. Rutherford, called upon Mr. Adam Brown to say a few words, to which that gentleman responded. He congratulated the Society upon the magnificent display and strongly urged upon all present to give their support to the Society.

The society, as there could be nothing more elevating than the love of flowers. He told the audience of the most successful results of distributing flower seeds to the school children in Hamilton for cultivation. ## GOT TWO BLACK EYES.

BEDDOW KICKED IN THE MOUTH AND TEETH WERE LOOSENED.

He Charged David Thompson and Fred Jones With Aggravated Assault, and They Were Remanded for Sentence—Prisoners Also Accused of Willful Damage.

At the police court this morning David Thompson and Frederick W. Jones were charged by Joseph Beddow with aggravated assault. All are employees of an uptown hotel. Beddow said he corrected the defendants for acting disorderly in the bakery department. As he was going upstairs, he swore, they jumped on him and beat him unmercifully.

They followed me up four flights of stairs, wore me down, and then they said, "and held me down on the bed and pounded me. Both my eyes were blackened, my lip cut and my teeth knocked out."

He swore that after the two had finished beating him, Thompson deliberately kicked him in the mouth.

"We plead guilty, but on great provocation," said the prisoners.

They claimed that they had all been out drinking together during the evening, and were in good spirits when they got back to the hotel. Thompson accused Beddow of knocking Jones down a flight of stairs. He admitted going up to the plaintiff's room, but said it was only to see that the plaintiff did no harm, as he had threatened to kill some one.

"They broke into the baker's shop and did \$15 damage," said Mr. Washington.

"That will be a separate charge," replied the magistrate. He remanded the prisoners until Monday for sentence.

A wages case in which Eliza Vaughan charged George Gray, proprietor of the Osborne Hotel, with owing her \$15 wages was settled out of court.

William Smith, 40 Pictou street east, arrested by P. C. Hill for being drunk, was allowed to go at sunrise.
