Ferry Boat. Messrs. McFarlane, Thompson and Anderson are manufacturing a ten-horse-power engine for the new ferry boat which is being built by Messrs. Gill. The boat which is nearly completed is a model of neatness and as she will be propelled by two engines, will probably have a high rate of speed.

Missing. Misfortunes never come singly, and this is eminently a fact with those of the burglar variety. Mr. Frank Doherty on Charlotte street is a much mystified man. Last week he made the discovery that a large quantity of his household effects, including over \$200 in money, were missing. Upon investigation, he has come to the conclusion that his premises had been visited a number of times and the goods taken in instalments. Mr. D. is at present in a quandary concerning the whereabouts of the missing articles and their possessor.

Weather Probabilities. There has been a snowstorm and a precipitation of about ten inches where there was no wind. In hilly places, it will be observed, snow fell considerably on the bias. For the next twenty-four hours the storm centre will not be stationary, and chimney smoke, unless it comes calm, will blow exactly in the same direction as the wind. Storm signals were promptly run up at Quebec as soon as they showed up since the last storm was blown down.—[METEOROLOGICAL ED.]

A Bad Fall. The good old times when people cut away the ice in front of their stores on Queen St. are but present in memory. There have been a number of painful accidents this winter that would not have taken place but for the indisposition evinced by merchants to expend a little muscle in making their respective sections of sidewalk suitable for travel. Tuesday morning John Bartlett of Musgraveville while walking up town, fell and broke her right arm on the corner of Queen and Carleton streets. She was taken immediately to a Hotel, where under the care of Dr. Bridges, it is reasonable to assume that she is in a fair way for recovery. She sustained injuries in her back also whose character is as yet only conjectured.

—There was a false alarm of fire Tuesday evening.

Daring Robbery.

About 3 o'clock Tuesday night, the Flour and Grain Mill owned by Alex. Gibson, Esq., was entered by parties unknown but furnished a quantity of flour abstracted therefrom. The entrance was effected by smashing in a window on the front of the mill. Four bags of flour of the "Holland Choice" variety were taken from the lower flat of the building passed through the window and placed on a hand sled.

The marauders two in number hauled their booty down the ice of the Nashua and followed the river for about a quarter of a mile when they made a clumsy effort to elude pursuit by carrying sled and bags over to the Marysville road and afterwards returning to the river. The parties have been run to earth and yesterday morning Sergeant Woodward was despatched to search the premises where the flour is supposed to be concealed. There is little doubt but that they are the same parties who entered the store at Marysville last December.

Since the above the following additional information has been obtained. Yesterday afternoon Sergeant Woodward arrived with Messrs. John & James Gibson and J. Baker searched the houses of Jas. Cochran and John Murchant at Gibson and found beneath the kitchen floors of their respective abodes, in equally distributed portions the missing flour and the articles taken previously from the store. These consisted of 2 chests of tea, 150 weight of tobacco and a quantity of dress goods, flannels, boots and shoes. Murchant was taken in his house, handcuffed and occupied by Sergeant Woodward. Cochran witnessed the approach and fled to the woods. After a vigorous pursuit on the part of the remainder of the party, the fugitive was captured and both brought to town and lodged in the county jail. Both have confessed. The examination takes place in the Police Court Saturday.

Within the last few weeks the dwellings of Messrs. Moses White, John Kyle, and R. Macklin of Gibson, have all been entered and a quantity of articles taken. This afternoon Sergeant Woodward investigated the premises and found a large proportion of the missing goods. The robbers seem to have been following up a systematic course of depredation since November 1st.

Fire at St Mary's.

The handsome school house built at the Episcopal Church, etc.

Yesterday afternoon between 12 and 1 o'clock the large and handsome school house at St Mary's was discovered to be on fire. When our reporter arrived on the scene the whole interior of the building was on fire, and a heavy wind blowing from the east, together with the futile efforts of the firemen to get the local engine to work, made the chances very doubtful of saving the Episcopal church close at hand.

The contents of the school house were all saved. The school was composed of three departments under the control of Principal Davis and Misses Staples and Marsh. Marsh, in whose room the flames were first discovered, states that the school was dismissed at 12 o'clock, the doors locked, no one left in the building and that the fire without doubt originated about the stove in her apartment. The stove was defective and coal had frequently dropped through the bottom on the zinc beneath, which was also full of holes, and was capable of being shifted out of position. No engine and an engine belonging to Messrs. Edgewood and Sons were hauled over from the city and prevented the destruction of the adjoining buildings. The Episcopal church and Mr. McKenney's tenement house were frequently on fire, and even the roots of the house and barn of Mr. James Hayes, 500 yards distant, were in danger from the thick shower of cinders that fell. The contents of the school house were entirely saved. The building had been built only a few years, and insured for \$200,000. Mr. McKenney's house was damaged to the extent of \$150; insured for \$400 in the Commercial.

Lumbering on the South-West Miramichi. Since the beginning of the lumber season of course many changes have taken place with regard to the map of the operations, transfer of contracts, etc., on the South-West Miramichi. As a general statement, outside of market and hauling distance, it may be said that the present winter has been the most favorable for work in the woods, of any year since 1870. Local Legislature.

TUESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Mr. Johnson said he had been wrongfully reported in two St. John papers. He did not think it right that the reporters should favor St. John. His speech, of Saturday, had been misrepresented and ridiculed, while the speeches of those who favored the removal of the capital to St. John were fully reported. It was a rotten piece of business, and should be condemned on the floor of the House. The rottenness just suited the *Sun*. Reporters might pretend that they could not catch his words, but when, at the end of the session, they put in their bills, they would be quite ready to catch the money. He hoped they caught his words this time.

Mr. Killam introduced a bill to extend the powers of the Peters Combination Lock Company.

Hon. Mr. Adams laid before the House the returns which had been moved for by Mr. Johnson, of correspondence with Deputy Clerk respecting free grants in Nelson Northumberland County.

Hon. Mr. Crawford presented the petition of W. J. Britain and 35 others, praying that a bill might pass altering the division line between the parishes of Norton and Springfield, Kings County.

Hon. Blair moved that all bills relating to the municipality of York and the City of Fredericton be referred to a select committee, of which the representatives of York shall not be members. Carried. Mr. Speaker appointed the following as such committee: Messrs. Gillespie, Covert, Black, Beveridge, McLellan, Hill and Kenny.

Hon. Mr. Fraser introduced a bill to authorize the municipalities and York to issue debentures to take up certain other debentures, with the petition of the municipal council in favor of its passage.

Mr. White introduced a bill relating to certain public offices and the salaries in connection therewith.

Mr. Speaker said he had looked into the bill and found that it had made provision respecting the appropriation of the public revenues. He would call the honorable gentleman's attention to it, so that he might be prepared, before moving for its second reading, to discuss the question of whether it is such a bill as could be introduced without the recommendation of the L.Governor.

The House was summoned to Legislative Council and on its return, was formed by Mr. Speaker that His Honor the Lt-Governor had assented to Acts enabling Trinity Church, St. John, to issue debentures, and repealing the Attachment and Garnishment Acts. Mr. Turner gave notice of motion for all papers relating to the claim of Lewis S. Steeves on account of the Pettaucodid Bridge.

After recess, replying to Mr. Gillespie, Hon. Mr. Speaker said he had not intended to let the Bank of Montreal have the Grand Southern subsidy bonds, if issued at par, had been renewed and made available for other banks.

WEDNESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

FORENOON SESSION.
After extemporaneous prayer, the Speaker took the chair. Marshall presented a petition from Mayor Ray of St. John, Sheriff Harding of that city, and from 1174 others of St. John, praying that the Legislature might grant an extension of charter to the Grand Southern Railway Company. Mr. Marshall made the main request of the Clerk to "read the names"—1174 of them—which direct task the official went through without a murmur. Two or three other bills were presented and then the Surveyor General informed the House that he begged to lay upon the table, in compliance with the request of the members from Gloucester (Ryan) a return of all the lumber cut in the County of Gloucester, and adjacent parts, during the years '77, '78, and '79; together with the names of the owners and any important information relating thereto. [We think Mr. Ryan will have no reason to complain that Mr. Adams did not give him all the information he asked for. If we are not mistaken, he has given too much—for the prosecution.—Ed.]

RECESS.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
McLellan moved the House in Committee on Sheer Boom Bill, and explained that it authorized the Company to accept lease of Boom Co. chartered in 1832, and to take over the Boom from Avocostock River to St. John River.

Blair objected to provide legalizing the first meeting of Company, and Fraser expressed doubts regarding the power of the Legislature to pass the Bill. Progress reported.

Elder introduced a Bill respecting Slaughter House Acts, to make provisions instead, with petition of the Municipality.

Morton presented petition of Richard Thorne and others, Havlock, Kings County, for removal of seat of government to St. John.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Bill vesting appointments of Chief of Police, St. John, in Common Council. Wedderburn could not endorse the sentiments of the Bill. Elder said he considered difference of opinion existed on one denomination, but Marshall was not prepared to favor the Bill. McLellan had not considered the subject sufficiently. Progress reported.

House went into Committee of the Whole on Bill for summary arrest of commercial agents on warrant of St. John Police Magistrate. Marshall explained its provisions. Passed.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on a Bill relating to solemnization of marriage. Wedderburn explained that the law required alien ministers to get new license upon changing parishes. The Bill makes one license sufficient. Progress reported.

Fraser introduced a Bill legalizing marriages performed by such ministers acting in ignorance of the invalidity of their licenses. Elder suggested making the Bill cover in the case of a minister passing from one denomination to another. Fraser approved of this. Progress reported.

Adjusted.

Kenny says that the reporters misreported his speech on the capital question. He had said that if portions of amendment respecting repairs to old buildings had been left out, he thought he might have suggested it, but he was opposed to repairs and opposed under all circumstances to removal of seat of government and believed three-fourths of his constituents would approve of his course.

Queen Victoria and Princess Beatrice will leave Windsor to-morrow for Germany.

Prince William, eldest son of Crown Prince of Germany, will arrive in England to-day, to visit Princess Augusta Victoria, his betrothed.

ENGLAND—PROBATION OF PARLIAMENT.
MARCH 23.
In proroguing Parliament, on Tuesday, the Queen said she is induced by considerations of public policy and convenience to select this period of the session for relieving Parliament from its duties with a view to its immediate dissolution and the issue of writs for a general election. She tendered her warm acknowledgments to Parliament and said that her foreign relations are favorable to the maintenance of peace in Europe. Confidence was expressed in the speedy settlement of affairs in Afghanistan. Referring to the measures for the relief of the distress in Ireland, she says she trusts they will be accepted by the Irish subjects as a proof of the ready sympathy of the Imperial Parliament. Her Majesty rejoiced in the present signs of general improvement in commerce.
