tions throughout the province, an average of twenty pounds of seed per acre is sown. The mixture com prises timothy, red clover and alsike. Ten pounds of timothy is always sown, and either ten pounds of red clover or five pounds of red and five pounds of alsike. Alsike is always sown where the land is in clined to be wet. It also has the reputation of being better able to withstand an acid condition of the soil. It is a safe policy to use from eight to ten pounds of timothy and a total of ten pounds of the two overs, the proportions depending, as noted above, more or less on the nature of the soil being seeded. In the case of failure to secure atch of seed, due to weather of some other factor, it is possible to seed a field in the spring with oats peas and vetches and harvest if for hay. If the land is in good heart, a satisfactory tonnage of good feed will be secured, although in wet seaons there might be some difficulty experienced in curing it.




