

Local and Other Items

Belgian troops entered Aachen (Aix La Chapelle) Rhenish Prussia, on Sunday.

London advices of Nov. 29, say the Entente allies have decided to demand that Holland surrender the former Emperor of Germany to justice.

Congress, in joint session, on Monday, heard President Wilson announce formally his purpose to attend the peace conference and give his views on the part the government should play in dealing with after war problems.

The Central Industrial committee of Belgium after an investigation estimates that Belgium's damage through German military occupation and seizure of machinery and raw material amounts to \$6,000,500,000 Francs, (over \$1,200,100,000).

SOLEMN PONTIFICAL REQUIEM.—On Tuesday morning of this week an Anniversary Solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem, for the late Bishop McDonald, was celebrated in the Cathedral. His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, was celebrant of the Mass, and he was assisted by Rev. Maurice McDonald, as Arch priest; Revs. Joseph Gallant and Wm. V. McDonald, as deacons of honor; Rev. Fathers Poirier and McQuaid as deacon and sub-deacon of office, respectively, and Rev. Dr. Hughes as Master of ceremonies. After Mass the *Litania* was sung and the absolution at the catafalque was given by his Lordship.

GOVERNOR-GENERAL COMING.—His Excellency, the Duke of Devonshire, Governor-General of Canada, is expected to arrive here tomorrow evening on a brief visit. While here he will be the guest of his Honor the Lieutenant Governor. A dinner in honor of his Excellency will be given at Government House tomorrow evening. On Friday forenoon His Excellency will hold a reception in the Provincial Building, when addresses will be presented to him by the City and Provincial Government. In the afternoon the school children will be visited in the Market Hall, and on Friday evening his Excellency will be entertained by the citizens at a banquet in the Hotel Victoria. On Saturday his Excellency will leave for Summerside, thence to the mainland.

ST. ANDREW'S CELEBRATION.—The annual St. Andrew's Day celebration, under the auspices of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island, took place in the Prince of Wales College Hall, on Monday evening last. The celebration was in the form of a banquet and soiree. The attendance was very large, and everything passed off in grand style. The viands, including the haggis, were of the very best and all present appeared to enjoy themselves exceedingly. J. D. Stewart, Esq. M. L. A. President of the Club presided, and the vice chair was occupied by the Vice-President Mr. G. J. McCormack. Local and Other Items

It is announced in London, that Germany lost 200 submarines, during the war.

Eight German Submarines surrendered at Harwich on the 2nd inst., making a total of 122 taken over by the Allies.

Premier Arsenault returned home Friday evening from attendance at the Ottawa conference of the Provincial Premiers.

The dinner given to King George at the Elysee Palace last Thursday night by President Poincare, the Paris newspapers declare, was one of the most notable events in the histories of Great Britain and France.

Sir Frederick E. Smith, Attorney General of Great Britain, interviewed, said that the British War Cabinet, including the Colonial representatives, have unanimously decided to press Holland to extradite the former German Emperor.

The conferences of the Provincial Premiers and members of the Federal Government were held in the Senate Chamber, in the Victoria Museum, where Parliament Assemblies pending the completion of the new building on Parliament Hill.

The Allied naval squadron recently passed through the Dardanelles into the Black Sea and anchored off Sabastopol the Russian naval base in the Crimea. On Nov. 26th the Russian ships which were in the hands of the Germans and also some German submarines were surrendered to the Allied naval representatives.

According to cable advices of November 29, Belgium was then clear of German troops. The correspondent of the London Times who has followed the retreat says that there has been little destruction in the country east of Mons. He says further that in the area between Mons and Charleroi the mines and factories are now working.

The C. G. S. Stanley has gone to Newfoundland in an attempt to float the steamer *Ascania* of the Cunard line. The *Ascania* is a vessel of 6,000 tons and was on her way to Montreal when she went on the rocks. The Stanley took some big pumps and is now at the scene of the wreck standing by to render any assistance necessary and there is hope that the *Ascania* will be floated soon.

Just before embarkation in England, a letter from the King and Queen was presented to each soldier leaving on the Aquitania for home. It read thus: Buckingham Palace, 1918. The Queen and I wish you God speed a safe return to the happiness and joy of home life with an early restoration to health. "A grateful mother country thanks you for faithful services." (Sgd) GEORGE, R. I.

The following figures referring to the Indian army have been given out in London. Strength of army at the outbreak of the war, 239,561. During the war, 1,161,789 were recruited, of which 796,747 were combatants. The number of men sent overseas was 953,374, of which 83,031 were killed, died of wounds or are missing, 52,296 were wounded, and 9,092 were taken prisoner. The majority of the casualties were suffered in Mesopotamia.

Sir Robert Borden Canadian Premier, speaking at the annual banquet of the American Thanksgiving in London on Thursday last approved of the plan to form a league of nations, but insisted that England and the United States are able to command the peace of the world by acting together. He said: "Let us have a league of nations if it can be realized, but at least let us have that understanding and unity of purpose and action between the two world-wide English-speaking commonwealths which will save humanity for years to come from the sorrow and suffering and sacrifice of such a time as this. The banquet was the most elaborate held since 1914. Representatives of nearly all the associated nations were present.

Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

Summary of Canadian North-

West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male

over 18 years old, who was at the com-

ing of the present war, and

who has since continued to be a British

subject or a subject of an allied or

neutral country, may homestead a quarter

section of available Dominion Land in

Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta,

applicant must appear in person at

Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agent

for District. Entry by proxy may be

made on certain conditions. Duties—

six months residence upon and cultivation

of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homestead

may secure an adjoining quarter-section

as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre

Duties—Reside six months in each of

three years after securing homestead

and pay \$1.25 (75¢ + 50¢) acres + 25¢

May obtain pre-emption patent as soon

as homestead patent on certain con-

ditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead

patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emp-

tion, may take a purchased homestead

in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per

acre. Must reside six months in each

of three years, cultivate 50 acres and

erect a house worth \$300.00.

Holders of entries may count time of

employment as farm laborers in Can-

ada during 1917, as residence duties

under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are adver-

tised or posted for entry, returned sol-

diers who have served overseas and

have been honorably discharged, re-

ceive one day priority in applying to

local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agent). Discharge papers must

be presented to Agent.
