Winnipeg, Man., May 10.—The markets were erratic. Continental markets were low and cables indicated that Russian offerings were very heavy at 2 1/2 cents under the Manitoba figures and pressure to sell that would indicate Russia is going even lower. The fluctuation of the market was fairly wide and the close 1/2 to 3/4 under Monday for May and July and October 1/4 higher. Oats showed a slight decline. The market was narrow, but prices are now about on an export basis to the United States, or nearly so, and this may lead to an improved demand. Chicago May wheat furnished the sensation of the morning, showing a range of 4 1/2 cents and closing 3 1/2 under Monday. July was down 1/4 and Sept. was 1/2 lower. Minneapolis May was weak, dropping 1/4 to 1/2; July went down 1/4 to 1/2 and Sept. was 1/2 lower. There was nothing new in the gossip to account for Chicago May. CHICAGO GRAIN MARKETS.

Chicago, Ill., May 10.—Russian buyers are in need of money and they have issued an order to the grain trade of that country to ship their produce and to leave the market in a straggling way. A cable from Odessa received on the board of trade today, stated that the fact of an important bank in that city. A local expert offered wheat to Antwerp today and received the following reply: "I have demoralized owing to the Russian offerings at 50 cents less than Canadian wheat, which is equivalent to 2 1/2 cents per bushel." The action of the heads of the financial institutions in Russia in causing a break in the wheat price at Berlin of 2 1/2 cents and weakened every market of the old world. Without a demand for the Canadian wheat, farmers and others of the United States with wheat on hand, will be obliged to hold it for home consumption, as the Canadian will be given the preference because of the price. Canadian Northern is 90 cents and Duluth No. 1 Northern \$1.13. With these facts staring us in the face, and the harvesting of the new crop in Texas less than a fortnight away, the lot of the holder is anything but a rosy one, as viewed from an impartial standpoint. May wheat slid downwards from \$1.15 1/2 to \$1.11 on an attempt to dispose of a few futures and it closed at the lowest point reached. There was no support at all. The reason for this demoralization was the fact that western and northwestern wheat is headed this way for May delivery. July and September were held up early by shorts covering and on buying by the big longs.

ONTARIO PHYSICIAN WRITES OF EDMONTON

Recent Visitor Tells About Our City Through Columns of Eastern Paper. Host of Possibilities of West Has Yet Been Told.

Dr. David Green, a prominent physician in southwestern Ontario, who has been visiting recently his daughter Mrs. J. T. Travis Barker, wrote an interesting article on his impressions of the West, and of Edmonton in particular, to the Platdealer, published in Ridgeway, Ont., a place of which he was a resident for 67 years. His story is as follows: After more than sixty years of continuous residence in Ridgeway, I am here in Edmonton with my wife at my daughter Mimmie's, Mrs. J. T. Barker, having spent the last time at our daughter's, Mrs. Wagner, forty miles north of this city. Our journey west was attended by every feature of interest and excitement that Nature in its happiest mood could attend and during the fourteen days since we arrived a sun and a moon of unusual brightness by night. March in this far away northwestern country, with gardening in process, seeding in full force and trees of millions of bushes beginning to show their beautiful tints. Rivers have long been to break, and people from every land and of every tongue are thronging the country. Some are setting out for more western and some more northern points.

A SUICIDE CAUSED THREE OTHER DEATHS

Italian Steamer Jumps Overboard from Steam Oceanic—In Lowering Boat to Rescue Men, Craft Capsizes and Three Sailors Are Drowned.

SS. Oceania at Sea, May 8.—(United Wireless) About 7.30 this morning an Italian steamer on the steamship Oceanic for some unknown reason committed suicide by jumping overboard. The ship's boat was immediately manned to effect a rescue, but in lowering it the boat capsized, throwing the men into the sea. Life preservers were thrown to the men and another boat lowered which rescued three clinging to the open grave of the dead. The steamer was driven in addition to the stoker. The ship stood by two hours and a half searching for the bodies, but with no results and at 10.15 a.m. proceeded on her way to Bermuda.

POLITICAL ARMISTICE POSSIBLE.

Newspapers Suspend Discussion on Constitutional Controversy.

London, May 9.—The morning newspapers today suspend their constitutional controversy, tacitly agreeing to suspend discussion of the matter as long as possible over the open grave of the dead. It is impossible, however, to exclude the topic entirely and action by the cabinet is awaited with interest. The Conservative Standard records its conviction that there will be no new election this year and the position will be greatly lessened for the present. The Conservative Morning Post inclines to the idea of an armistice, but the House of Commons and the House of Lords are not with it. The House of Commons could not with decency be immediately consumed at the close of the spring recess.

LORD CARRINGTON HONORED.

King George Appoints Him Lord Great Chamberlain.

Canadian Associated Press. London, May 9.—Lord Carrington, who frequently has been mentioned as the probable successor to Earl Grey, has been appointed by the King, Lord Great Chamberlain. Speaking at Liverpool on Saturday afternoon or postponement until the return of Empire Day celebrations. Hon. STATISTICS OF FOREST PRODUCTS OF CANADA

Bulletin Issued by Forestry Branch of Department of Interior Relating to the Production and Consumption of Forest Products of the Dominion.

"Forest Products of Canada, 1908." is the title of the latest bulletin issued by the forestry branch of the Department of the Interior. It comprises the result of the first year's work of the Dominion forest service in the compilation of statistics relating to the production and consumption of the forest products of the Dominion. Messrs. H. R. MacMillan and G. C. Hatches are the compilers of the figures.

This work was undertaken by the forestry branch with the object of obtaining complete and reliable statistics relating to the use of wood in Canada, more frequent than the census figures, which are published every ten years.

The returns do not profess to be complete, but are thought to be reasonably accurate, and at any rate give a fairly good idea of the quantities and values of material and products in the different lines.

The total value of the production of lumber, lath, shingles, cross-ties, poles and pulpwood during the year 1908 was valued at \$1,200,000,000. The production of sawn lumber is shown by the figures to be in the neighborhood of 3,248,176,000 feet, which cost \$54,338,086. In this Ontario leads, with a production of 1,294,704,000 feet, valued at \$21,200,000. The second with 690,135,000 feet, of the value of \$10,838,608, and British Columbia third, with 647,977,000 feet, valued at \$10,838,608.

As to Shingles.

British Columbia easily leads in the production of shingles, producing 72,428,000, valued at \$1,200,000. Its nearest competitor is Quebec, which produced 406,440,000, valued at \$4,064,400. Ontario produced 223,533,000, valued at \$4,470,660. Nova Scotia, 62,638,000, valued at \$626,380. Manitoba, 41,382,000, valued at \$827,640. Saskatchewan, 31,166,000, valued at \$311,660. Ontario, 56,447,000, valued at \$1,128,940. Alberta, 41,382,000, valued at \$827,640. The total production for the Dominion was 92,914,000, valued at \$1,810,196.

Production of Laths.

In the production of laths Ontario takes first place with 3,263,341,000 to her credit, valued at \$612,866. Little more than half that number, 1,631,670, were made by her nearest competitor, New Brunswick, the value of whose product is \$298,698. Quebec made 92,914,000 laths, worth \$1,810,196. Nova Scotia, 62,638,000, valued at \$626,380. Manitoba, 41,382,000, valued at \$827,640. Saskatchewan, 31,166,000, valued at \$311,660. Ontario, 56,447,000, valued at \$1,128,940. Alberta, 41,382,000, valued at \$827,640. The total production for the Dominion was 92,914,000, valued at \$1,810,196.

Railway Ties.

During the year the railways purchased 13,978,416 cross-ties for which they paid \$5,281,968. Of these the steam railways (47 in number and having a total of 25,772 miles of track) bought 13,738,167, paying therefor \$5,159,674, and the electric roads (numbering 22 and having 818 miles of track) purchased 240,259 ties costing \$122,294. Cedar (including under this term both the eastern and the western cedars) is easily the favorite wood for ties, twice as many ties being made of this species as any other, while hemlock and tamarack in about equal numbers take next place.

Held for Murder of Constables.

Montreal, May 10.—Timothy Canby, the Liverpool Irishman, employed as night watchman in the Ames-Holden factory, was this morning held responsible by the coroner's jury for the deaths of Jules Fortin and Daniel O'Connell, two policemen shot Friday night by a man they were attempting to arrest on a charge of theft. Fortin died the same night; O'Connell last night.

Liverpool Irishman, Watchman for Ames Holden Company, Says He Shot Both Constables, Fortin and O'Connell, Instantly, When They Pinned Hands Behind Him and Revolver Went Off.

Montreal, May 10.—A full confession was this evening made by Timothy Canby, the Liverpool Irishman, who had been arrested on the charge of murdering Constables Fortin and O'Connell last Friday night. Canby, who was arrested at the Ames-Holden warehouse, said he had arranged with a second hand dealer to buy his stolen boots, and took a bag of them to dispose of them. But when he went into the store, Constable Fortin arrested him, and after a struggle Constable Fortin came to the policeman's aid.
