CENSUS FIGURES WILL TELL STORY OF CANADA'S PEOPLE AND WEALTH

Census Men Will Have a Lot of Questions to Ask, and When the Answers Are All in and Tabulated Pretty Near Exaggerating, Worth Knowing About Canada and Canadians Will Be There—People Must Co-Operate With Enumerators.

The census, or gathering of statistics with respect to the internal affairs of the Dominion of Canada, will take place on the first of June, 1911, and all information gathered shall have reference to the same date, unless otherwise specified in the schedules or determined by the minister of agriculture.

The following information gleaned from the schedules and instructions issued under the direction of the agricultural minister and of direct importance to the big cities may be learned once the idea of the immense amount of labor entailed, and the success of which can only be obtained by the co-operation of the Canadian people everywhere in this Dominion.

Schedule No. 1 comprises the population by name, personal description, age, and the following questions will appear on the census paper: Name of each person in family, place of habitation, sex, relationship to head of family or household, whether single, married, widowed, divorced or legally separated, month of birth, year of birth, and age at last birthday. The following questions as to citizenship, nationality, and religion, also appear: Country or place of birth, year of immigration to Canada, if an immigrant, year of naturalization, if formerly an alien; racial or tribal origin, nationality, and religion. Five questions appear under the heading of profession, occupation or means of living, to wit: Chief occupation or trade, employment, other than at chief occupation, or trade, if any, employer, employee, or working on your own account.

Better Figure This One. The census also delves into your otherwise private affairs as in the matter of wage-earners, thus: State where person is employed, "on farm," "in a mill," "in a factory," "in a drug store," etc. Weeks employed in 1910 at other than chief occupation or trade, if any. Hours of working time per week at other occupation, if any. Total earnings in 1910 from chief occupation or trade, if any. Rate of earnings in 1910 from other than chief occupation or trade, if any. Rate of earnings per hour when employed by the hour.

If you are insured the government wants to know, and asks the amount on life, accident or sickness insurance, and cost of insurance in census year. Your education and language will also be looked after, as will be called upon to answer the months at school in 1910, whether you can read or write and the cost of education. In 1910 for persons over 16 years of age at college, convent or university. With regard to your physical condition, the following questions confront you: Whether you are blind, deaf, and dumb, crazy or lunatic, idiotic or silly, if you are unfortunate, enough to come under the head you must specify at what age the infirmity appeared. Schedule No. 2, dealing with mortality, and containing 22 questions, as follows:

1. Name of person.
2. Sex.
3. Single, married, widowed, divorced, or legally separated.
4. Year of birth.
5. Age at last birthday.
6. Country or place of birth (if in Canada specify province or territory).
7. Racial or tribal origin.
8. Religion.
9. Profession, occupation or trade.
10. Place of death, if it occurred away from home. (Give name of place, hospital, or other particular address).
11. Name of attending physician.
12. Physician's post office address.
13. Nature of loss or injury caused by accident in census year.
14. Cause of the accident.
15. Weeks of disability in year, due to sickness or due to accident, loss of salary, or other earnings caused by sickness or caused by accident. Voluntary allowance to employee or employer, under statute in census year.
16. Compensation by employer under statute in census year for loss of life by accident or for injury by accident.
17. Compensation by insurance in census year for loss of life, or for sickness or injury.
18. Questions For Everybody.
19. Schedule No. 3 is intended for the heads of families and aims to get information concerning the fruit crop of 1910, and the number of bearing and non-bearing fruit trees in 1911, also the amount of grapes produced.
20. Schedule No. 4 is intended for the farming community, and seeks to find the products of the farm and the price received by the farmer for his grain. Every kind of grain is included in this schedule, and are divided as follows: Fall wheat, spring wheat, barley, oats, rye, corn, for husking, buckwheat, beans, peas, fax, mixed grains, hay and clover, alfalfa, corn for forage, and other forage crops.
21. Schedule No. 5 is in regard to tobacco, hops and straw seeds in 1910, and field crop areas in 1911.
22. Schedule No. 6 comprises the number of animals and animal products and the number of pure-bred animals registered or eligible for registration in 1911.
23. Schedule No. 7, dealing with farms and urban values, asks for statistics with reference to farm urban values (real estate and live stock), live stock and nursery stock in 1910; dairy products consumed on farm, sent to factories or sold in 1910; animals slaughtered on farm in 1910; other products of the farm, such as wool in 1910; eggs in 1910, honey and wax in 1910; maple sugar and syrup in 1910; hired labor on farm in 1910, total number of hired labor, including board; value of all lands and buildings, not including factory establishments, or mines owned in Canada, outside of enumeration district in 1911.
24. Schedule No. 8 seeks the following information in 1910, dealing with the timber, waxy or flat excluding ash, birch, elm,

DECORATE GRAVES OF SOLDIERS IN WINNIPEG

Parade With 2,000 in Line Held From Fort Osborne Barracks to Cemetery. Fort Osborne Barracks to Cemetery. Hundreds of Regiments Represented.

Winnipeg, May 16.—Over two thousand soldiers, young and old, representing hundreds of regiments of the British military forces and even some celebrated naval commands, paraded to the cemetery of St. John's yesterday afternoon and decorated the graves of departed comrades interested there.

The parade, under most ideal weather conditions, attracted a hundred thousand spectators to various points along the two miles route from the Fort Osborne barracks to the cemetery.

Rev. A. W. Woods addressed the assembly at the barracks, and Rev. Canon G.H. delivered the sermon at the cemetery. Sir Daniel McLaughlin, lieutenant governor and Col. S. D. Steele, M.V.O., C.B., D.O.C., reviewed the troops, regular, volunteer and veteran and boy scouts at the barracks.

This was the first occasion in the 25 years the ceremony has been performed, that the city of Winnipeg took official part in it, the members of the council attending in a body and contributing many handsome floral emblems to the mass of beautiful offerings laid upon the tombs of Canada's dead soldiers in the local cemetery.

The arrangements were carried out without a hitch, and the cloudy day, after the deluge of the night before, made marching easy and free from dust.

The foreign office, added Mr. Chaplin, took the gravest view of the suggested separation of Canada from the imperial treaty system.

Wm. Carroll Sentenced to Death.

Sault Ste Marie, Ont., May 13.—Sentence of death was pronounced on William Carroll, aged 65, today, by Justice Britton, and the date of execution was set for May 25. Carroll was found guilty of the murder of Callum Thomson, aged 21, in a lumber camp near Sault Ste Marie, Ont., last summer. The jury recommended mercy.
