THE DIOCESAN SYNOD.

YESTERDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The afternoon meeting of the Synod began yesterday at 3.30 in the usual manner with prayer. After the roll had been called, the minutes of the last meeting were read and carried. The business of this meeting was confined to Committee reports and notices of motion. The Rev. G. H. Bolt presented the report of the Queen's College Council. The work of the College was embodied in the report and the results in the number of Clergy supplied to the ministry. W. W. Blackall, Esq., presented the report of the Education Committee of the Diocesan Synod. This report shows that since its appointment in 1908 the Education Committee held 14 meetings, and met the Government on three occasions. Following on the resolutions of last session of Synod, the Committee prepared a memorial which was presented to the Government in May, 1909, in which a loan was asked for to provide funds for the erection, equipping and maintenance of school buildings, also for increased grants for Superior schools, colleges, training teachers, feeble-minded and elementary education in St. John's. The result of the Committee's action has been that the Legislature has given \$100,000 as a building fund, and has devoted large increases for other educational funds. The report contains regulations upon which money will be lent to Boards for building purposes. Twenty-five Boards have received grants from the Church's share of the \$100,000, and 33 schools have been aided to the extent of \$12,225.00. The Committee's attention having been drawn to the lack of funds for elementary education in St. John's, the Government was again waited upon, and an amount has since been voted for this purpose. The report ends with a suggestion that the Committee should be formally recognized as Trustees of the Building Fund and the Advisory Board for the Church of England Department of the Superintendent of Education.

The Hon. John Harvey, as Manager of the Committee of the Clergy Suspension Fund, presented his report. The annual sum available is now \$1,500. The annual income is now \$2,452 from an invested capital of \$50,462.09.

Rev. G. H. Bolt gave notice that at the next general meeting he would introduce a Bill to amend certain chapters of the Constitution and Rules of the Diocesan Synod, and another Bill for the establishment of the Bishopric Maintenance Fund.

During the afternoon a letter was read from G. H. Dickenson, Esq., Secretary of the City Club, notifying the Synod of an invitation on behalf of the Club to all the clergy to use the Club rooms during the session. Dr. Pilot proposed a vote of thanks to the Club, which was carried by acclamation.

Meeting adjourned at 4.30. At 7.30 the chair was taken by the Bishop. The report of the Executive Committee was read by the Rev. G. H. Bolt, Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, and that of Bishop Spencer College.

The report of the Executive Com-

mittee referred to the death of King Edward, and to the losses sustained by the Diocese in the deaths of Hon. G. T. Rendell, Revs. A. E. C. Bayly, R.D., and Rev. T. W. Temple. Certain changes have taken place in the Clergy list, the full number being now seventy-five. Permission has been given to build eight churches and four parsonages. The mission of Bonaville has been erected into a Parish, Rev. A. G. Bayly, M.A., being its first Rector. Reference was made to the destruction of the Parsonage at Foxtrap and the church at Burgoe, and the loss of the Church ship. An additional priest has been sent to the mission of Flower's Cove and the two catechists withdrawn. Gifts amounting to over \$20,000 have been received from England. The amount received from the Pan-Anglican offering will be spent in establishing new missions, and a beginning will be made by the division of the missions of Hermitage and Harbor Buffett. The S. P. C. K. depot has a considerable amount of stock on hand, which is difficult to dispose of. The Clergy Widows and Orphans' Fund needs to be strengthened, there being now seventeen persons receiving grants from this fund. There are now three pensioners drawing pensions from the Clergy Retirement Fund. The Clergy Suspension Fund is in credit to the amount of over \$50,000, and now makes an annual grant of \$1,500 to clergy stipends. The Home and Foreign Missions Fund has not received the support it should. The Diocesan

amendment, Chap. 18, Section 4, Clergy Retirement Fund, by addition of sub-section 5, "Clergy absent on leave shall pay during absence their subscriptions to this fund. Canons Bishop and Noel and Rev. J. T. Hiscock spoke on the matter. The amendment was carried.

The House resumed at 10.05. The Bishop announced that the C. E. T. S. rooms upstairs are open to members, lay and clerical, for purposes of reading, writing and recreation during the session. He urged the lay members of the Synod to make an effort to be present during the afternoon.

The House adjourned at 10.10 p.m. with the Benediction.

Late Edward Jenkins.

Author of "Ginx's Baby."

If ever there was a cosmopolitan it was Edward Jenkins, the son of a clergyman born in India, educated in Canada and the United States, and afterwards a barrister and journalist in London. As a politician he was far in advance of his time, as an ardent outspoken Imperialist as a member of the House of Commons he was a comparative failure. He disgusted all parties by his eccentricity and his flighty ways. Beginning as an extreme Radical he changed about until at last he became an out and out Tory. Jenkins was, however, a splendid success as a journalist and leader writer. His great hit which made him famous was the classic "Ginx's Baby"—a most amusing satire on English sectarianism. Another notable production was "Little Hodge." For several years Jenkins was Agent General for Canada in London. As a journalist he made a great success with the Indian Mail and the Overland Mail. His literary productions are very numerous, but none of them hit the public taste like "Ginx's Baby." Jenkins was a great friend of some of my relatives; and as a talker and pleasant companion he had few equals. Of late years his health was poor, and he lived in complete retirement. In his day he was a power.
