Weights and Measures!

The following sections of the Act
Respecting Weights and Measures
are published for general informa-
tion:

"Any person who shall use a
beam, scale, weight, or measure, in
the sale or exchange of any com-
modity, not assayed and stamped, or
who shall alter the same after being
so assayed and stamped, or who shall
use steel-yards, except for the pur-
pose of weighing hay or straw, or
who shall use a beam made of wood,
shall forfeit a sum not exceeding
twenty dollars."

"Salt may be sold by measure, or
by weight; if sold by measure, there
shall be eighteen gallons to a tub
(liquid measurement), and three
tubs to a hogshead. Any person who
shall sell or dispose of salt by meas-
ure otherwise than according to the
standard hereby established, shall
forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty
dollars."

"The Chief Inspector, and Inspec-
tors shall, when required, inspect and
adjust all beams, scales, weights and
measures, brought to the office of
either of them, according to the said
standard, and they shall stamp or
mark thereon the initials of the
reigning Sovereign, and their own
proper initials."

Wireless Station Destroyed by Fire.

good wishes for Mr. Nicholls.

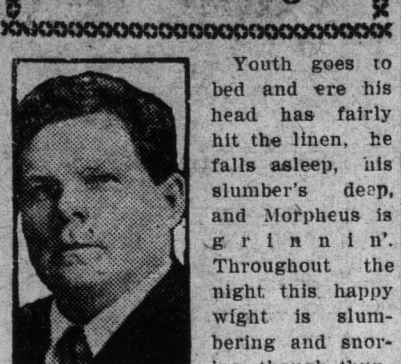
Declared 6 P. C.

SCH. FROM SEAL FISHERY.—The sch. Cedella arrived at Channel yesterday from the Gulf seal fishery, reporting for 250 old seals, which is a good trip. There is another Channel vessel engaged in the sealing hunt this spring in the Gulf, as exclusively re-ported in the Telegram some time ago.

In the hurdle race he tied with Mr. Eric Bowring's re-cord time of 14 2-5 seconds and also won the pole vault making a splen-did leap.

SMALLPOX.—Another outbreak of smallpox was reported in the city yes-terday afternoon. Four cases were reported. One in the Moakler family, already under quarantine, on Pleasant Street; two in the Evans family next door and the fourth is in a house on Carter's Hill. The latter patient has been brought to Hospital, the others being treated at home.

STANDING BY WRECK.—Capt. Plumb is still standing by the wrecked steamer Glace Bay. Mr. Eric Bowring is also on the scene in the interests of salvors. The ship is now almost submerged. The forward part of her is high on the rocks and with a strong easterly wind she will be broken up.

SLUMP IN SALMON.—Owing to the comparatively large quantity of sal-mon on the market yesterday the price which was from 20 to 25 cents per lb. in the forenoon fell to 15 cents in the afternoon as sale was not brisk. After a few more days no doubt the price will reach the normal figure of 10 cents.

BOYS INTOXICATED.—About 4.30 p.m. yesterday, people passing up New George Street, were surprised and disgusted to see a boy being led along by some friends in an intoxica-ted condition. The lad swore and used some awful language and later left his friends and met a chum who also had liquor taken, and both wan-dering into George Street and attacked an old man there. Constable Tobin arrested one of the lads and an effort will be made to discover where they got the liquor.
