GREAT BRITAIN'S WEALTH AND HER WARS.

A Boston local financier says: "I have made recent computation that may be of some interest. I figure that if the war continues two years longer at the same rate of expenditure about \$5,000,000,000 per annum for Great Britain, the debt at the end of three years of war will be no larger for the British Empire than it was per capita at the end of the Napoleonic wars."

"And I figure that to-day the British Empire has a wealth one hundred times greater than she had at the time of the Napoleonic wars, and her material resources have been developed a thousand times, measured by the English pound sterling."
