Letter From a Plucky Survivor.

The following letter was written by Private James McGrath, of St. John's, at one time an employee of the Telegram, to his mother. He was wounded in the great advance, and his experience must have been a hard one, though it is modestly told.

3rd London General Hospital Dear Mother.—It gives me great pleasure in taking up my pencil to write you a line; by the time you get this you'll know all about the Regiment, they got a terrible cutting up.
I suppose you have already seen by
the casualty list where I was wounded
but not serious. I am wounded in both legs, right arm and a little be-low the hip. I will tell you the 1st of July, 1916, I will never forget. We dvanced to the German trenches at in the morning and the machine in trouble. He immediately left the Island to report the same at St. Jacques. Dr. Fitzgerald and two men named Tibbo and Burke left for the rescue. Their boat collided with the s.s. Hump. Mr. Burke was drowned and the Boctor and other tree was reported. the Doctor and other two men were saved. Grave fears are held for the safety of Messrs. Ryan and Clinton."
