Rum and Brandy. THIBSTY BANDITS HEAVILY FIN-

Five men of the Salmonier road whose ages ranged from 30 down to 19 years, appeared before Judge Morris this morning in the Central District Court, upon the charge of having, on the 8th inst., held up and taken by violence from one, Alan Moriarity, five cases of brandy. Three of the accused were further charged with, on the following night, taking by violence from one, Carroll, on the Salmonier road, two five gallon kegs of rum. It appears that, in the first case, Moriarity purchased this brandy from — (well—we won't give it away!) and was in a carriage when he was surrounded by the five accused who demanded over to them. Moriarity, naturally, demurred and even flourished a revolver which, however, either from anxiety for the bandits or from fear of the consequences, he did not discharge. In spite of his protestations, he was deprived of what would have provided a good many nightcaps and possibly an excellent source of revenue.
