## Newfoundlanders and 3 Others Lost When Steamer Cuts Down N. S. Vessel

### Amateur S.O.S. Call Brings Liners Rushing to the Rescue—Russian Reds' Money Accepted by Cape Breton Miners—Eight Hour Working Day Rejected by the Commons.

#### NEWFOUNDLANDERS AMONG THE LOST.

HALIFAX, May 1.—Three lives were lost late yesterday when the Nova Scotia three-masted steamer Cape D'Or, Captain C. M. Wilkie, hove to off Cape La Have, was rammed by the United States Shipping steamer Clackamas, Captain McGuire, inward bound from Norfolk, Va., with a cargo of 2,700 tons of coal. The Cape D'Or nose dived to the bottom three minutes after impact, taking with her the entire crew of 25 men who was in the boat clear of the falls at the Cape. Captain Wilkie, his mate, George East of Otrera Lake, Halifax, and Roy Dunworth, of East-Parade, Halifax County, were rescued; but the captain's wife, Margaret Leone, aged 41, her son, St. Pierre Wilkie, single, and her daughter, Justin Warren, both of whom were Newfoundlanders, were drowned. Mrs. Wilkie's body was picked up and brought ashore, and the remains of the other three were in an unsuccessful search for the bodies of the Clackamas returned her voyage to Halifax.

#### TOLL OF THE SEA.

HALIFAX, May 1.—[By Canadian Press.]—The loss of the Nova Scotia steamer Cape D'Or, with Captain Wilkie's wife and four members of the crew through collision with the Clackamas, off Sambro Light, last night; the loss of the Norwegian steamer Møldgaard, ashore off Pennant Point, at 10.41 this morning; the loss of the Cape D'Or, with her crew in imminent danger on account of their inability to launch boats or the rescue of the crew; and the loss of the steamer Azov, ashore on the Cape Breton coast, near Arichat, with her

stern was lifting slightly with the heavy seas. He was unable to launch the boats and felt the crew would be in danger if they attempt to remain on board through the night. With a molasses cargo, the Azov, bound to Montreal from Cuba, ran ashore during the night on the Cape Breton coast, near Arichat, and is believed to be a total loss. Her crew took to the boats and were successful in reaching the shore without loss of life.

#### EIGHT HOUR DAY REJECTED.

LONDON, May 1. The Hours of Industrial Employment Bill, which has its basis in the Washington eight hour day convention, was rejected in its second reading by the House of Commons to-day, 233 votes to 128.

#### REDS' DONATION ACCEPTED.

GLACE BAY, May 1. J. W. MacLeod, District President of the United Mine Workers of America, to-day confirmed receipt of \$5,000 for relief of distress in the colliery districts of Nova Scotia, from the Red International and Russian Miners' Union, through J. B. McLachlan.

#### FRANCE AND THE GOLD STANDARD.

PARIS, May 1. Finance Minister Caillaux told newspaper men to-night that France cannot remain indifferent to the tendency of other countries, notably Britain, to return to the gold basis. Much remains to be done, he said, before that question can be taken up, but as soon as the situation permits France will be obliged to adopt the same policy.

#### CHURCH UNION FIGURES.

TORONTO, May 1. The Church Union Bureau of Information to-day issued the following summary of voting on the matter of the entry of the Presbyterian Church into the United Church of Canada:—Total membership 374,951; ballot vote for Union 102,096; unanimous membership, 27,595; total for Union 129,691; ballot vote against Union 106,018. There are 4,549 Presbyterian congregations in Canada. To date 2187 have voted. Manitoba and New Brunswick do not vote until after consummation of Union.

#### SILK NOT A LUXURY.

LONDON, May 1. An amendment to the Budget will be moved by the Labor party in the House of Commons, demanding the entire dropping of the proposed duty on raw silk. Almost hourly the silk industry is becoming more vocal against Chancellor Churchill's proposals with regard to the duty. The silk manufacturers of Leek, Staffordshire, have sent a telegram to the Chancellor stating that the duty on raw silk would mean the ruin of the silk industry and that assent silk is not a luxury in these days.

#### THE CAUSES OF SUICIDE.

KITCHENER, Ont., May 1. Dr. J. E. Holt, of this city, discoverer of the treatment of abdominal fibroids with X-ray has announced, after years of research, the theory by which he establishes the primary cause of suicides and claims as a result of his investigation that 90 per cent of suicides are preventable. He declares it is all wrong to lay suicide at the door of mental conditions arising from shock, loss of money, worry and other mental stress. These, he asserts, are only secondary or contributory. The real causes are certain pathological pathological generations, gradually brought about by certain habits of life.

#### TREATY APPROVED.

OTTAWA, May 1. A resolution approving the treaty between Canada and the United States providing for "further debarcation of the international treaty," was passed by the House of Commons this afternoon and referred to the Senate. Premier King in introducing the resolution stated that the treaty had been signed in Washington on February 4 last by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, and was awaiting ratification of parliament.

#### ACCIDENT TO OCEAN LIMITED.

QUEBEC, May 1. Shaken into consciousness from their sleep when engineer Joseph Gagnon jammed on the brakes in an effort to save their train from wreck, some hundreds of passengers of the Ocean Limited, the Canadian National Railway's "million dollar" train from Montreal to Halifax, turned out in pouring rain, about one and a quarter miles east of Lévis, in what clothes they could hurriedly put on, early this morning, to find that the engineer, and fireman Emile Courcier, had gone over a 12 foot embankment with their locomotive and were imprisoned there, while mail and express cars were derailed on and around the track. The cause of the wreck were boulders which had fallen down from a cliff. None of the passengers cars left the rails and no passengers were injured, but engineer Gagnon may give his life for sticking to duty and thus saving the people whose lives were in his care from injury or death. The accident happened at 12.47 a.m.

#### LIBERALS TICKLED OVER BUDGET MAJORITY.

OTTAWA, May 1. After twenty-four days of debate the House this morning adopted the Budget by a majority of 37. The vote was, for 123, against 86. This unexpectedly large majority aroused wild enthusiasm among the Liberal members. Their forecast had been between 20 and 25 and when the result was announced they banged their desks in applause and flung sheaves of paper in the air. The Liberals and Progressives voted for and the Conservatives against.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 1. Violent earthquake shocks occurred to-day near Adana, Turkey, according to reports received here from that vicinity.

#### MONTREAL REDS HOLD PARADE.

MONTREAL, May 1. Local Reds held the annual May Day Parade this afternoon but nothing exciting happened. The procession was orderly. There were no fiery speeches, nor were there any display of large Red banners, both omissions being due to orders from the City Hall. At first there were more policemen than paraders, the authorities having decided to be fully prepared for possible rioting, but the services of the constables were not required once during the whole day.
