NOTES

Last year, it is stated, that the
government received a revenue of
\$2,350,000 for liquor sold by its
dispensaries. It would be interest-
ing to figure out the sum received
by the medical men for the "pers"
issued by them.

The Adolescent Act is receiving
many adverse criticisms, but it is
left with the Real Estate Owners'
Association, of London, to pro-
nounce as follows: "That the Act
will prove in ten years' time the
biggest curse rapid educationists
have ever run up against; it will
act as a boomerang upon the school
teachers by filling our cities with
an army of half-witted professors
and school teachers looking for
jobs with toes out of their shoes
and their coats worn out at the
elbows."

To the farmers of Canada is due
the credit of the rapidity with which
the country is being restored to the
pre-war conditions. J. H. Gundy,
of Toronto, emphasised this when,
in addressing a meeting at Hamil-
ton, he pointed out that the value of
Canadian produce had increased in
the past ten years from \$500,000,000
to \$984,000,000. Canadian farmers
were responsible for this increase,
and none could gainsay that they
were probably the vital factor in
helping the Canadian dollar to get
back at par.

"Our Canadian farmers," he
stated, "have affected this increased
production from the soil without
any great corresponding increase
in population. It is such produc-
tion as this that will enable us to
keep our finances sterilized."

PRICES IN GREAT BRITAIN

Ontario Farmers To Be Kept Posted In
Market Quotations

The completion of arrangements
will give the Ontario farmer
necessary information to intel-
ligently market his produce in
Great Britain has been announced
from the Parliament buildings from
the office of the Department of
Agriculture. It is stated that, com-
mencing April 1st, the department
will receive twice weekly a cable
letter from England, which will
give the prevailing prices of the
more important agricultural com-
modities and the general market
outlook for agricultural products.
This letter, which will be received
in code, will be decoded and trans-
mitted to the press of the Province.

The statement in which the an-
nouncement of the bulletin was
made stated in part: "A cable
letter will be received here twice
weekly, giving the prevailing
market prices for cheese, butter,
bacon, condensed milk, tobacco,
fruits (fresh and canned), cattle,
and eggs. In addition to the prices,
the market outlook and general
market conditions will be set forth."
"The object of this service is to
provide a regular and authentic
source of market information for
the Ontario farmer."

TO REGULATE ONTARIO'S GARAGES

An Act to regulate public auto-
mobile garages and service stations
has been introduced in the Ontario
Legislature. The bill has been
brought forward by the Labor
group in the House.

The bill calls for the appoint-
ment of a board of examiners con-
sisting of three competent
mechanics, skilled in the practical
construction, operation and repair
of motor vehicles, and qualified to
pass the examination of first-class
automobile mechanics. This board
would determine the subjects in
which candidates for certificate
of qualification as automobile
mechanics would be examined and
also supervise the examinations.

According to the terms of the
new Act all men employed in
garages as mechanics must first ob-
tain either a first-class or second-
class certificate and in order to
secure same must pass an examina-
tion conducted by the Provincial
Board of Examiners. Also the
garages themselves would be
licensed and subject to inspection
by Government officials at any
time, under penalty of a \$200 fine.

BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING

The annual meeting of the Bible
Society was held in the Methodist
church on Wednesday evening.
The attendance was fairly good but
not large enough to show the ap-
preciation which the Society really
deserves. Rev. Mr. Bowen said
Largie and Wallace town branches
showed much greater interest by
their larger audiences and more
generous contributions.

The pastor conducted the devo-
tional exercises and A. E. Cantelon,
president, and R. K. Panter gave
the business report.

Rev. Mr. Bowen gave an eloquent
address, replete with up-to-date in-
formation, which cheered and en-
couraged his hearers. In speaking
of Russia, he said that country,
under the Soviet regime, had large-
ly suppressed religious activities,
endeavored to stamp out the Christ-
mas spirit, had ridiculed the writers
of the Gospels and had glorified
Lenine and Trotsky as saints and
had burnt God in effigy, was now,
under the encouragement of the
government, asking the Bible So-
ciety to send in several thousands
of copies of the Scriptures.

COMMISSIONERS NAMED

At the meeting of the London Pres-
bytery on Tuesday Rev. Dr. Gaudier,
of Knox College, was nominated for mod-
erator of the General Assembly. The
presbytery chose as its ministerial com-
missioners: Rev. W. G. Ross, of Dela-
ware; Rev. J. U. Stewart, of Belmont;
Rev. J. D. Bannatyne, of Bethel; Rev.
N. Stevenson, of Lambeth; Rev. W.
Gauld, of Formosa (home on furlough);
Rev. N. A. Campbell, of Ilderton, and
Rev. A. L. Orr, of West Lorne.

Lay commissioners will not be chosen
until later, as a committee is to deal
with a selection in the interim. London
will have no minister commissioner, as
no city churches are entitled to repre-
sentation this year under the rotation
plan.
