

OF NEGRO ENTERPRISES

(By The Associated Negro Press) New York, July-In an address last night to the members of the New York Association of Trade and Commerce, Dr. Robert R. Moton, President of the National Negro Business League, said that "due to the co-operation of the Negro business men of the Harlem district and to the energetic endeavors of the colored people themselves, I am reliably informed that seventy-five per cent of the real estate occupied by Negroes in Harlem is owned by them. That is a remarkable showing which is heartening to the Negroes of the South, who are making rapid strides along business lines, as well as to friends of Negro progress in all sections of the country. I am sure that such progress as you are making will hasten the time when New York Capitalists will be turning some of their investments into the channels of Negro business enterprises, North and

Dr. Moton urged the establishment of a million dollar fund for the protection and expansion of Negro enterprises, and congratulated the Association on its plan to present in Harem during the week of July 23rd Negro Business Exposition.

Other addresses were made by Alderman George W. Harris, of New York; Dr. Charles H. Roberts, of New York; and Albon L. Holsey, Secretary of the National Negro Business League. John E. Nail, of Nail and Dark Dispensers of White Blessings. Parker, who is President of the Association, presided.

(By The Associated Negro Press) Birmingham, Ala., July-Special civil service examinations for colored stenographers and typists will be held points of the Civil Service Commission, July 17, it has been announced. successful applicants will be appoint ed to the United States Veterans' Hospital, Tuskegee.

Information given is that both white and colored will be eligible, but it is the desire of the commission to secure as many colored eligibles from the examinations as possible, "as it will be the policy to select colored eligibles when reached for appointment to position in the Tuskegee Hospital, therefore, colored persons who are qualified are urged by the commission to enter the examinations." Salaries for these positions will average \$1,200

NEGRO ADJUTANT GOOD

At the Welcome Meeting to Adjutant and Mrs. Mlotshwa at the new Crocodile River Corps, South Africa, held under a big tree because the Hall was too small to accommodate the crowd, the following message was received at the hand of the Chief's brother:

"I, Chief Gendhlana, welcome you to this my country and people. wish you to win us to your Saviour. Being unable to come myself to welcome you, I am sending my brother and my people. We are heathen, but we thank the Salvation Army for coming among us. We shall help you in any way we can, and yiu will help us by the glorious life you bring to us. We like the Salvation Army, you can work right through my country and no one will hinder you.

The Chief's brother, speaking for himself, said, "I am pleased, very pleased, to receive the Adjutant and his wife. All my father's people and I welcome you; we promise to stand by you and shall help you; but you understand that we are heathen and ignorant, you will guide us. You are now father and mother to us."

Thirteen Recruits were sworn-in as Soldiers. Fifteen persons came forward seeking Salvation.

(By The Associated Negro Press) New York, July-On June 14, Dr. John Love, Secretary of the Negro State Fair of North Carolina, and President of the National Association of Colored Fairs, who had been in New York for some time, left the city with an appointment to meet Robert Cross, the Secretary of the National organization, and manager of the Norfolk Colored Fair. The two had appointments with prominent Government officials for the purpose of making an appeal for exhibits at Negro Fairs of the dsplays that are prepared by the Department of Agricultur. The Mining Bureau, the Department of the Interior, and other administration bodies for such use.
