IN A FIERY ASYSS.

A Deadly Blaze in a Milwaukee Theater.

The Roof Fell In-Firemen Perish-The Exact Number Not Yet Known.

MILWAUKEE, April 9 .- Fire early this morning destroyed the Davidson Theater and Davidson Hotel. A score of firemen fell through the roof. Nine are reported killed and as many more have been removed to the hospital.

Later-At 4:20 this morning flames were seen breaking out from the rear of the Davidson theater and hotel, a structure valued at \$300,000. Immediately on the arrival of the firemen ladders were run up and men rushed up on the roof, six stories from the ground.

The following went down with the roof and were rescued. Lieut. Curran, of Company No. 1, probably fatally injured; Fred Marsh, foot crushed; Fred Schroeder; John Yoe, badly burned and back hurt. The building was used for a theater on the ground floor and rear while the portion above the ground floor to the front was utilized by the Hotel Davidson, with an annex standing to the north, which was not damaged. The burned portion of the hotel was well filled with guests, but they all made their escape without injury, though a panic prevailed. Many of them were in hastily made toilettes or in scarcely anything at all.

The fire originated apparently on the stage. The Liliputians were filling a two weeks' engagement at the house. The members of the insurance fire patrol company were covering up the seats of the parquet when suddenly a little light appeared in the roof above. They ran back just in time to escape the falling roof. They saw the struggling firemen and debris fall into the burning akyss.

THE AGONIZING CRIES of the men could be heard for a short space of time and then they died away as their vitality was overcome. There was no escape for the men who fell on the stage. They fell into a blezing pit and were covered by the debris of the roof.

The entire interior of the magnificent theater soon became a furnace. Just how many fell with the roof is not known, although John Yeo says he thinks there must have been twenty who went down.






